THREE THOUSAND DAY OLD CHICKS

Your Uncle Samuel is getting to be some "old hen," if we are to judge by the way in which he is handling chickens lately.

On Saturday of this week the United States Mails brought to Forest Grove from Petaluma, California, a single shipment of 1,800 of the tiniest, cute little White Leghorn chicks you ever saw, and just the night before twelve hundred came through the same way from the same place. The latter shipment was received by A. C. Smith, the chicken man who lives in the northeast part of town. The eighteen hundred shipment was divided between Welford Miller and J. E. Pogue.

These little birds are hatched out in the sunny clime of California and then mailed direct to the purchaser. They came all the way through in small boxes and it is surprising what little space it requires for them. They get not a bite to eat from the day they are hatched until they arrive at the ranch or their final destination.

A Forest Grove girl, a great lover of nature, approaching a typical fisherman up Gales Creek way, said: "Ah! have you not seen a mist gliding down the hilltop like a specter? Have you never," she went on impassionately, "seen the moon struggling to shake off the grip of the ragged rugged stormcloud?" "No, Miss," responded the fisherman, "I used to see them things, but now the country's dry."

Due directly to the food and clothing America has sent to Polish children through the American Relief Administration on European Children's Fund, 115 Broadway, the child mortality in Poland, which during the war was set at a maximum in 1918, has considerably decreased throughout the country during 1919.

By careful buying the American Relief Administration on European Children's Fund is able to purchase a complete outfit for every Polish child in need, for \$5.00. This includes shoes.

The food or clothing that this money buys will reach the children of Poland in a remarkably short time. This is made possible by the splendid system of distribution which has been built up in Poland. 216 committees of public-spirited Polish men and women are in charge of this system. The nation has been divided into fifteen regions, each region being subdivided into large relief centers and those again being divided into smaller ones under the jurisdiction of sub-committees.

The regions are Nowy Targ, Krakow, Iwo, Tarnopol, Lublin, Kowel, Brzesc-Pinsk, Grodno, Wilno, Iomza, Warsaw, Kalisz, Czenstochowa, Radom, Sandomierz, and the city of Warsaw. Krakow, Lodz, Wilno as also Upper Silesia are regarded as separate regions.
