About 150 delegates were present

He regained consciousness, but only lived a few moments after being taken to the hospital. It is thought that he was mentally unbalanced. A few months ago he and his wife were divorced, but he still retained a room in the house. He was a member of the G. A. R., which Order had charge of the funeral the following Wednesday.

Arthur E. Dailley, who has been a rural mail carrier on the Laurel route for the past fifteen years, died in this city Sunday night of last week, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. F. Losh. He has, for several months, been suffering from heart trouble, and was compelled to give up his position. He was born in California about fifty-six years ago and has lived in Oregon twenty years. He leaves a wife, four sons and four daughters. The funeral was held at Laurel Wednesday at 2 o'clock.
