

PRIMARY ELECTION
BRINGS LIGHT VOTE

Many Surprises Noted in Return Throughout State.—L. M. Graham Defeated for Legislature.

The News-Times finds it an impossibility to this week give the complete election returns from Washington County's primary which was held on Friday of last week, and will content itself by giving a few of the figures available.

There were many surprises throughout the State by the defeat of prominent men and measures. Locally the defeat of Hon. L. M. Graham for re-election to the legislature is one of the most surprising imaginable. None of Mr. Graham's friends ever dreamed that he would be defeated for re-nomination. He has made one of the hardest working, most painstaking conscientious members of the Legislature and that he would be returned to the lower house was not questioned. But it seems that there was over-confidence by his friends as well, possibly, as by himself, as he made no campaign to speak of, not even announcing his candidacy in the newspapers of the county.

We give the vote in this county on the leading candidates as follows: In the vote on the various measures that were before the people of the State all carried, even to capital punishment, which went in by a small majority. In this county every measure received a majority vote. Complete figures may be given next week.

SCHOOLS CLOSED
UNTIL SEPTEMBER

Only Three of Old Instructors Will Return for Next Year.—Many to Be Discharged.

Beaverton schools closed Friday for the summer vacation and will not reopen until September. The year has been a very successful one, in spite of many difficulties and students have practically made up for all lost time of last year. The eighth grade pupils have not yet heard the results of their final county test, but local teachers feel that the test were easily within the knowledge of the pupils and good grades are confidently expected.

There was no graduating class from the high school. Wm. A. Schraeder and Francis Livermore finished their work in February and no other students had sufficient credits to finish this year. There is a large junior class and next year will see a creditable class finish the high school.

Of the instructors who have carried on the work this year, only three will return for next year. These are: Mrs. Ada Ival Wilson, seventh and eighth grades; Miss Marie Davis, fifth and sixth grades; and Mrs. Austin Harris, who taught third and fourth the past year, but will have second grade work for next year.

There remains to be elected a primary teacher and a third and fourth grade teacher for the grades, and at least two high school teachers.

Miss Ella Gunderson, high school teacher of last year, will go to Moro high school.

COUNTY AGENTS' NOTES

Aphis Attack Possible

Numerous inquiries have been made recently regarding the possibility of another serious aphis attack to the hay and grain. Some of the reports made from sections of this county, and from other counties, indicates that a serious attack is not impossible, though it is hardly considered likely.

The cold, rainy weather of March and April was highly beneficial to the development of aphis in large numbers, but the freeze during the winter decreased their numbers and prevented their breeding during that season, so that there were fewer at the beginning of the spring weather which favored development. Another condition which will prove unfavorable to them, is that the early warm weather of this year favored the increase of the natural enemies of aphis, especially the lady bug, and they are now present in the fields in larger numbers than at the beginning of the serious attack of two years ago. It is therefore believed that though some fields, especially of vetch, have spots which are rather badly attacked, the aphis will not be a serious menace, though some damage may result.

Apparently thus far, grain fields have not been attacked, the aphis confining themselves to vetch fields. A number of gardens have become infested, but the insects can be controlled by the use of nicotine sprays.

Mole Pools Discontinued

Mole pelt pools will be discontinued until further notice, owing to the slump in the fur values, and also the fact that Portland is the best market in the United States.

The pool of last month, consisting of about 400 furs, was shipped East and arrived just in time to meet a reduction in fur prices of 60%. It was then found that though the slump had also affected Portland, that the dealers there were yet paying the highest prices of any dealers, and the Eastern shipment will be returned, and disposed of to Portland firms.

Hereafter, pelts may be sent direct to the Portland dealers, and as much will be received in that manner, as through the pool, at the same time a saving in postage will be effected.

Should Eastern prices again become higher than those here, the pools will be resumed.

FORMER GROVE MAN DIES IN WISCONSIN

The following is taken from a Clinton, Wisconsin paper:

On Friday, May 7, 1926, Wm. H. Butler passed away at the Wisconsin Veterans' Home, Waupesa, Wisconsin, where he and his wife had been spending the winter. Although in poor health, he had been quite comfortable until Feb. 18, from that time on he had gradually failed.

He was born in Cambridge, England, July 1, 1839. He came to this country with his parents in 1844, locating in Onida County, New York.

In 1854 they moved to Clinton, Wis. and from that time to the present the family have been closely identified with the history of Clinton. Mrs. Susan Pye, whose death occurred a little over a year ago, being the oldest of the family.

Mr. Butler enlisted in the 11th Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry in 1861, serving to the end of the war. Three brothers and a brother-in-law also served in the same war.

Mr. Butler was married on March 21, 1870, to Margaret J. Maltress of Edgerton.

The greater part of his life had been spent in and around Clinton, with the exception of a few years on the Pacific coast.

Wm. H. Butler was well-known in Forest Grove, having resided here for a number of years. He leaves to mourn his loss, his widow, also one brother, Joseph T. Butler, formerly of Forest Grove, now of Gladstone, four nieces, Mrs. H. B. Hodson, of Portland; Mrs. F. A. Everett, of Hillsboro; Mrs. W. E. Child, of Boring; Mrs. Dave Story, of Gaston, and one nephew, Orion Grisham, of Gaston. Funeral services were held on Monday afternoon at the Baptist church, Rev. F. W. Bales, officiating.
