FRUIT ASSOCIATION GROWS

No more crop contracts to market this season's berries or cherries will be accepted by the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association after June 7. In the Rogue River Valley the closing date was June 1 for apples and pears. Closing dates for other kinds of fruit will be announced soon for the Umpqua and Willamette Valleys.

During the past four weeks, since the Salem Fruit Union voted to go out of business, 45 new members with 700 acres of fruit have joined the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association. The total acreage in Western Oregon now totals over 28,000 owned by 1800 members.

Sites for new plants have been secured during the past few days at Grants Pass, Riddle, Myrtle Creek and Forest Grove. At Grants Pass a large apple and pear packing plant will be erected on the old cannery property. The new prune packing plant at Forest Grove will be located west of the cannery on adjoining property. The building for the new prune processing plant at Dallas is already half built and the plant of the Scotts Mills Prune Packing Corporation has been purchased.
