searching for her successor.

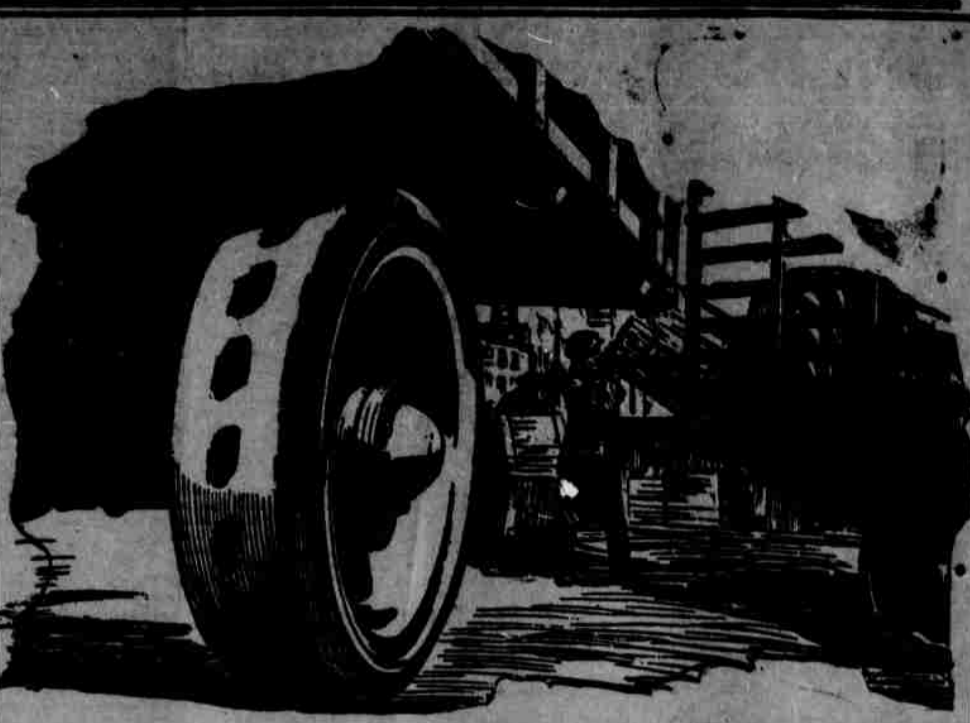
Paul Robinson, 18-year-old son of

Julius Baxter Vrooman, born in
1842 and for 59 years a resident of
this city, died at his home here Aug.
14. He was a cabinet maker and car-
penter and was at one time promi-
nent in construction work in Hills-
boro. He is survived by his widow
and one son.

Passengers of the Tillamook
train had a narrow escape from a
serious accident one day last week.
While running at a high speed on the
grade between Cochrans and Timber
the train struck a dead log which had
fallen across the track. Both engines
were derailed but the log was brittle
and snapped with the impact. The
cars remained on the track and the
engines kept an upright position.
The train was delayed nearly eight
hours. Experienced railroad men
state that if the log had been a green
one the train would doubtless have
been badly wrecked and the loss of
life very large.

The purchase of the Fred Hood
farm of 332 acres, across the Hood
bridge from Hillsboro, by the Title
& Trust Co., of Portland, indicates
the establishment of the giant wire-
less station here. It has been com-
mon talk for several weeks that
Hillsboro was to receive this vast
enterprise. While agents investi-
gating the sites have talked freely of
the construction intended, nothing of
a definite nature has yet been given
out regarding the purchase of this
property, but it is definitely known
that the Title & Trust Company rep-
resents the big wireless company in
the transaction and abstracts are al-
ready being prepared in the case.
