One of the roads now planned by the county court is one from Reedville north to Oregon to give the people between Oregon and North Plains a direct outlet to the Tualatin Highway.

Miss Pearl Allen, former instructor in mathematics at the Hillsboro high school, who resigned a short time ago because of poor health, has returned to her home in Amity after a month's visit here. She will spend the winter in California.

The taxroll for 1920 will be smaller than that of the year previous says Assessor W. P. Boley, because the automobiles are now assessed by the state and not by the county and for that reason we will lose about a half million dollars of taxable property values to offset it. The total tax roll of the county will not be known until the Board of Equalization meeting in October passes on objections to the assessor's valuations.

Richard Stowell, of Buxton, recently fractured his wrist when the crank of an automobile turned the wrong way while he was helping a friend to start his car. He has taken an enforced vacation from a wood contract as a result.

Two prune growers from the East end of the county who passed through Hillsboro last week from the prune chautauque at Forest Grove, were B. Leis, of Beaverton, and F. M. Crabtree, of Laurel. Both report fine yields of prunes in their orchards.

County road crews are now busy with packing a stretch of road near Greendale which will reach from the Frank Salomon place to Joe Campbell's ranch and will improve one of the worst pieces of road in that section. If the weather and labor conditions permit, the stretch will be completed by the end of the month.

The new schoolhouse in District 29, just beyond Buxton and near the Columbia County line, is completed, according to reports brought to Superintendent N. A. Frost last week by Albert Schmidt. The big building, 222 feet in length, which is probably the highest in Oregon, if not in the world, is a source of much pride to the people there.

Mrs. John E. Bailey, of above Buxton, died August 23. Paralysis has induced a long illness and she succumbed to it during the night while she slept. Hannah Roper was born at Coburg, Canada, September 2, 1844 and married John E. Bailey at Evert, Mich., September 27, 1874. Of the five children born to them, two sons, Charles and Frank, survive. She is also mourned by her husband, four grandchildren and a host of friends. The funeral was held at Buxton, August 25.

An echo of the Jackson robbery at Cornelius when the drug store at that place was looted of watches, fountain pens and other articles of value and for which Peter Rithaler was later arrested, came out at Vancouver, Wash., last week when two girls, giving the names of Pearl and Ruth Rogers, were arrested on a charge of being implicated in relieving Harry Zimmerman, of Seattle, of \$1800. The two girls were in Hillsboro for the fourth and conducted a refreshment stand here. It is alleged that Rithaler and his accomplice shared the jewelry taken from the Jackson store with the two girls.

HALF MILLION BRICK BURNED
The Forest Grove Clay Products Co., fired their second kiln of brick Wednesday morning of last week and they have now about ready for delivery nearly half a million brick, the largest kiln ever fired in Washington County. For about three weeks the company was shut down because the contractors for the Masonic Home were delayed in their work and were not ready to receive the brick at the time expected. But the plant is again running and another big kiln, this time of building blocks and drain tiles, is being manufactured and will be ready to fire in about three weeks.

Mr. Randles, manager of the concern, says that there are a number of homes to be built here this summer of building blocks, construction to start soon after this kiln is ready for delivery.

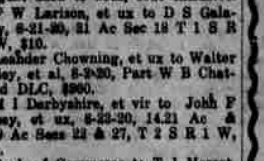
