News of Seaside Public Interest at the County Seat.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Edgar, of the Seaside neighborhood, are the parents of a girl born September 2.

Rev. J. N. Wood, former Free Methodist pastor here but now of Albany, was a recent caller in Hillsboro.

George Mayes, former Hillsboro barber, is again working at the trade here after three years' absence.

Mrs. C. W. Rollins attended the sessions of the Pacific Northwest Library association in Portland last week.

Wm. Greig, of Laceyville, has so far recovered from his recent illness to be able to haul wheat to town. He has a crop of 2000 bushels.

Henry Schmeltzer, who was injured in the logging camps some weeks ago is able to be out with the aid of crutches.

Bryson Wauken, 12 years old, of the Gale Creek district, who was kicked by a horse two weeks ago, is recovering at a Portland hospital.

Reports come from the Scholls neighborhood that the prune crop has been damaged by an excessive drop and the yield will not be as good as expected.

Mrs. C. W. G. Hyde, of Minneapolis, Minn., mother of Dr. L. W. Hyde, was his guests here recently while on her way to California for the winter. She spent the summer at Rocky Mountain resorts.

The will of N. S. Prickett, who was killed by a Southern Pacific train at a crossing in Hillsboro the latter part of July, has been filed. It gives the entire estate to the widow, Elizabeth Prickett, who is also made executrix.

Perry LaFollette, of Cornelius, while attempting to pass another car on the highway near Witchazel recently, had to ditch his car to avoid a collision with a third car. With him in the car were Mrs. LaFollette and Mr. and Mrs. McPherson. Both ladies were injured.

O. T. McWhorter, newly-appointed county agent, who succeeds N. C. Jamison in that office, has arrived and is getting his work in shape. He comes from a similar position in Gray's Harbor County, Washington, and is well recommended for the place. Mr. Jamison is now in the employ of the Dairyman's League.

Hillsboro people look forward to the opening of the new Southern Pacific city station in Portland. The Southern Pacific Company recently bought the Lyric theatre building and plan to build it over into a modern city station that will serve them for many years to come.

Eliza Solberger, 57 years of age and a widow, who lives on Route 3 out of Hillsboro, has made application for Americanization papers. She was born in Berne, Switzerland and emigrated here in 1886, by way of Havre, France, and New York. Her husband died before completing his naturalization, hence the widow's application.

City Engineer Leveck has taken samples of the foundation erected for the dancing pavilion in Shute Park and has had compression tests made for use in case of litigation growing out of the action of the city in stopping work on the pavilion. The samples secured crumbled easily in the hand, despite the fact that the concrete has set for nearly four weeks when the samples were taken.

George McGee, former county surveyor, who has been spending the summer at Timber, looking after his holdings there, was recently in town and reports that the high winds have blown over a number of old stumps in that locality. One dairyman had several cows penned in by falling timber in such a manner that they would have starved had they not been found. None of the cows were injured. There have been many fires in the timber section but generally all of them have been caused by carelessness in logging, one company which patented its trains and kept watch of its donkey engine suffered no fire.

The garage being constructed for Dr. Tammis, of Portland, just east of the Washington Hotel, a large

structure of building blocks, collapsed Friday night. The east wall of the structure and the roof as far back as the front part of the roof extended, fell suddenly and seriously damaged the property adjoining. No one was in the garage at the time and one of the bedrooms in the house adjoining was damaged. A mass of building blocks virtually covered the yard in this room. In the other room were two little grand-daughters of W. J. Rowland, owner of the property, but they escaped injury, although the room was badly wrecked.

32 Bean Cows Detected

Thirty-two beaver cows were detected and eliminated from the nine cow-testing associations of Oregon in July. The 5071 cows tested averaged 743 pounds of milk with 23.06 pounds of fat for the month, says the report of E. S. Pitts, federal and O. A. C. field dairyman. Honor cows—producing more than 40 pounds of fat per month, were 1237. The highest was "Pal," a grade Jersey cow belonging to L. A. Cochran, of Tillamook, with a record of 107.12 pounds of fat. Pal is in the same herd as "Fennie," who broke the association record in June with 115.66 pounds of fat.

LATE APPLE MOTH SPRAY MAY NOT BE NECESSARY

Where control has been good from previous sprays the late summer spray for codling moth will probably be unnecessary in the Willamette valley, reports A. L. Lovett, entomologist of the O. A. C. Experiment station.

"This is due to unusual weather conditions which delayed codling moth development earlier in the season," the report says. "The advisability of spraying will depend largely upon weather conditions in early September. Should warm weather prevail during the next two weeks, the usual aerial spray should be applied."

The report applies to the Willamette valley in general, but growers are asked to observe local conditions to determine whether it is best to spray or not. The temperature of early September, nearness to ungrazed orchards, and effectiveness of former sprays, will help to determine whether or not the late spray is needed.

SOME INTERESTING THINGS ABOUT HOMING PIGEONS

One of the most spectacular pigeon events ever arranged in this country will be contested on September 25, next, when thousands of Rexall Homing Pigeons, racing in pairs, will fly from points within a radius of 500 miles of St. Louis back to the home lofts in that city.

The most predominant trait in the character of the homing pigeon, of course, is his love of home. His birthplace, the loft in which he is bred, reared and trained, is home and no other spot on earth, no matter how alluring, has any interest for him.

He may be carried off, miles from home, and tossed off into space. Eventually he will return. It may take days, or it may be only a matter of hours, but no anxiety is felt on the part of his mate, for she knows that he will be back, sooner or later. Devotion to mate and their young, and love of home is so dominant in their natures that they are oblivious to all else.

There are no slackers in these families. Both male and female do their part towards making a home. The male bird finds the materials of tobacco leaves and stems, and the female sets herself to the task of actual nest building. Once mated, pigeons remain mated for life. They never waver in their constancy and loyalty to and love of mate. At the age of three months the young pigeon looks about for his wife and once he wins her, and this only after the most ardent wooing, he is hers till death and he slaves for her and their progeny from dawn till dark.

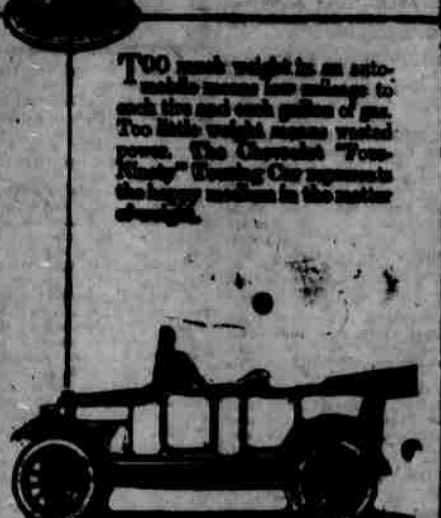
