Don't Plant the Little Potatoes

Now that the best potato growers are looking over their field for their best hills for next year's seed, it may be well to drive another nail in the coffin of sorting out little spuds for seed.
A grower of Nettle Gem potatoes, near Redmond, has two fields. Both are on new ground, both are irrigated and both are planted at a similar manner.
What is the difference then? One field was planted to his large potatoes, the other to the small potatoes from the lot.
On inspecting them for certification, August 16, the potatoes from from large seed showed 6 per cent disease—blackleg, wilt, rhizoctonia, curly dwarf. The small seed showed 20 per cent disease and the plants were harder hit.
The two fields do not even look similar—yet many people buy such seed and plant it.
One well known grower well expressed it when he said "We did the country a damage when we took seed prices for our hog feed this spring."

TO CHANGE THE CHARTER OF CITY OF FOREST GROVE
