Million New Cars Add to Road Wear
That the present interest in the construction of new highways should not divert attention from properly maintaining highways already improved is a point which the Bureau of Public Roads, United States Department of Agriculture, has had occasion to emphasize many times in recent months, particularly in view of the enormous increase in motor vehicle traffic which is taking place. The bureau recently completed a compilation of statistics from all the States of the Union showing that there were a total of 7,555,446 registered motor cars (including motor cycles and trucks) in the United States in 1919. This is an increase of 23 per cent. of 1,415,829 motor cars over 1918. Such figures indicate that the country's highways are being used far more than in the past, it is pointed out, and in consequence added attention must be given to the repair problem. The increase in the number of cars for 1919 over 1918 represents about 10 per cent more cars than the total number registered in the entire United States for 1912.

Additional use of roads and streets has, of course, been accompanied by additional revenue paid to State and local governments in the form of license fees, which in nearly all States are devoted to highway needs. The registration and license fees for automobiles, trucks, and motor cycles in use in 1919 totaled \$64,697,256.58—an increase of 20 per cent over 1918.

FOREST GROVE ITEMS
(From the News-Times)

The beautiful new pipe organ that for so many months has been in prospect for the congregation of the Congregational Church, is now being installed, and the same is to be dedicated next Sunday at the morning service at 10:30 o'clock. Extra special numbers will be rendered by the Church choir, and the sermon of the morning will treat on "The Mission of Music." The Rev. W. Walter Blair, pastor of the Church will preach, and have charge of the service of Dedication.

The organ will be used at both morning and evening services, and the general public are invited to attend the services Sunday and have the pleasure of hearing the new instrument.

On Monday evening, Oct. 4, a grand Organ Recital will be given at the church, under the leadership of Prof. William Robinson Boone, of Portland, assisted by the Church Organist, Mr. Russel E. Beale, and the Church Choir. This recital will present so varied a program of musical selections that all those attending will have the opportunity of hearing what the quality of the organ is, as well as its splendid capacity.

Prof. Boone is organist at one of the largest churches in Portland, and also of the Scottish Rite Cathedral. He is to be the Organ Soloist at the opening concert in the Municipal Auditorium with the Rosarian Band on Oct. 10th. He is Past Dean of the Oregon Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, and a former President of the Musicians Club, and has given numerous recitals of note throughout the Northwest. It will be one of the year's real treats to hear Prof. William Robinson Boone next Monday evening.

The organ is a two manual and pedal organ, equipped with electric blower, and is a Tubular Pneumatic Action throughout, with automatic pedal and piston stops and individual motor valves for every speaking pipe, of which there are over four hundred and fifty. The design and finish and the setting of the organ completes the equipment and appearance of one of the most beautiful church auditoriums to be found anywhere in the state of Oregon, and is an asset not only to the Church life of our city, but to the community as a whole.

At the meeting of the City Council Tuesday night a very cordial in-

visitation was extended to the Methodist Episcopal Conference, now in session at McMinnville, to hold their next session in Forest Grove. On motion the City Attorneys was instructed to prepare and the Mayor and City Recorder were instructed to sign the invitation.

About 30 citizens gathered in K. P. Hall Tuesday evening to discuss with the council in an informal way the proposed changes to the city charter. Mayor Hoffman was chosen chairman and with the aid of L. M. Graham, directed the discussion of the changes. Mr. Graham read portions of the charter and much comment was heard on the proposed change to a city manager. A vote was called for and of those voting, 13 favored the city manager plan and one vote was opposed.

Belief was freely expressed that the public is not fully enough advised as to the nature of the new charter and it is possible that the council will arrange to have copies printed for distribution before the final draft is submitted to the council for approval.

The prospects for Forest Grove's future have attracted to this city two of Portland's leading photographers and before the middle of October two first class photo studios will be in operation here, turning out the very highest grade of work of which the metropolitan artists are capable.
