Poultry Culling Demonstrations

On Thursday, October 14th, Poultry Culling demonstrations will be held in Schefflin farm bureau community at the farm of Wm. Chalmers at 9:30 A. M.

At 2:00 P. M. of the same day the Hillside Community will hold a demonstration at the farm of Chas. Clapham, near the Hillside church.

The demonstration is free to all interested in poultry and will be conducted by Hubert E. Coby, Poultry Extension Specialist of the Oregon Agricultural College. Only a short time will be taken up with lecture work. The greater portion of the time will be taken up by actual demonstration, using live birds and each one present will have the opportunity to handle birds and do actual culling.

Selection of breeding stock, and other poultry questions will also receive attention.

HIGHWAY COMMISSION FIGHTS ROAD SIGNS

Request From County Court and State Officials Is That Private Owners Keep Signs Off.

The Oregon State Highway Commission at its last meeting ordered the State Highway Engineer to take steps to clean up the Highways of advertising signs. This, of course, applies to any signs within the right of way. Any one who traveled the new roads has noticed that without restrictions the sides of the highways will soon be one line of unsightly signs.

Just so long as the owners of the private property will rent space to the sign owners, we will be unable to keep the roads free from these unsightly things. The County Court and the Highway Department appeal to the residents and property owners along the highways not to allow signs to be put on their property and in cases where the advertising companies have erected signs and leased the space, not to renew the lease when the same has expired. The only reason for this appeal is that most people want to see the highways beautified and signs such as we now have are not a thing of beauty.

To those who have signs within the right of way and want these signs, this will be notice to remove them. In the event signs are not removed, the Highway Department will remove same.

STARCH MARKET FAILS; FACTORY GRINDS GRAIN

Potatoes Scarce and High; Textile Mills Buy Little Starch; Gifford Put in Rollers.

The starch market is off and potatoes are scarce and high; these two facts mean that there can be no profitable operation of the factory of the Pacific Potato Starch Company this season, so manager W. C. Gifford has put in a grinder and a roller and is operating the plant as a feed mill. He calls it the Beaverton Great Mill and he is prepared to roll or grind any kind of grain on short notice.

Red Cross Announces Roll Call

The American Red Cross will hold its Fourth Annual Roll Call during the two-week period beginning with Armistice Day, November 11th, and closing with Thanksgiving Day, November 25th. This is not a "drive" like the campaigns carried on during the war. It is simply the annual enrollment and re-enrollment of members in this great humanitarian organization.

Last year nearly 10,000,000 persons responded to the Roll Call and of this total number nearly 380,000 were residents of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Alaska, the territory included in the Northwestern Division of the American Red Cross. Washington has over 190,000 members; Oregon nearly 115,000, Idaho nearly 60,000, and Alaska nearly 7,500. It is the expectation of the Red Cross that all these persons will renew their memberships this year, and that there will be many additions to the membership roll.

The Red Cross comes before the public with a program of vital importance to every community. The organization is committed by the terms of its Congressional charter to continue to act as a medium of communication between the American people and their Army and Navy. It has pledged itself to stand by disabled ex-service men as their families until they are re-established in civil life. Realizing that the health of the people is the greatest asset of the nation, the Red Cross is entering actively into the field of public health activities. Health centers and clinics are being established in communities throughout the country.

Nurses are being trained and furnished to towns and counties; and women in all walks of life are being instructed in the principles of home hygiene and care of the sick. Social service, similar to that rendered to the families of service men during the war, is being extended to all persons in need of friendly assistance.

These and numerous other activities, will be carried on in the various local Red Cross Chapters if the people of the Communities continue

CEDAR MILLS WANTS INLAND HIGHWAY

Delegation of Prominent Citizens Why in Town—Beaverton to the Coast.

FOREST GROVE CHOSEN BY METHODISTS FOR '21

Reverend G. A. Gray Returns to Pastorate of Local Church—County Changes Few.

Beaverton Methodists are no longer a part of the Salem district of the Western Oregon Conference. The meeting at McMinnville not only returned Rev. G. A. Gray to the pastorate of the local church, but they made this change and all those surrounding Beaverton a part of the Portland district.

The 1921 session of the Methodist Episcopal conference will be held in Forest Grove. Thanks to the kindly offices of Reverend Charles R. Carlos and the good work done by the lay delegate and the members of the local congregation, the conference accepted the invitation extended by the first church of Forest Grove and the City Council and will come here for its next meeting.

Rev. C. R. Carlos has been returned to Forest Grove Methodist Episcopal Church for another year. He was successful in the endeavor to have the Annual Conference meet in that city next fall. It will be thirty-five years since the Oregon Conference met here. At that time Bishop Harris presided and the Conference membership has increased to over one hundred and fifty and with others that will attend the community will be called upon to entertain probably two hundred and fifty. Dr. Carlos had the backing of the other churches, the Pacific University, the Commercial Club, and the Mayor and City Council. This enabled him to secure the conference over four competitors, although it was a close contest. Forest Grove won out by eight votes, which was afterwards made unanimous.

A drastic change was the elimination of the Klamath Falls and Eugene districts and formation of the Southern district. In order to even up the districts 15 churches were transferred from the Salem to the Portland district, and a few from the Eugene to the Salem district. Under the old four-district system Portland district had 31 churches, Eugene 35, Klamath Falls 32 and Salem 68. A few new churches have been added during the past year, bringing the state total to 187, divided as follows: Portland district 48, Salem district 53, Southern district 68. Dr. W. W. Youngson was reappointed superintendent of the Portland district and S. A. Danford, of Ashland, made superintendent of the new Southern district.

The churches in Portland to receive new pastors are: Epworth, Laurelwood, Lincoln, Mt. Tabor, Rose City Park and Sunnyside. Dr. T. H. Gallagher of North Dakota comes to Sunnyside to relieve Dr.
