NOTICE OF DISTRICT ROAD MEETING TO VOTE SPECIAL ROAD TAX IN DISTRICT NO. 32.

Notice is hereby given that a meeting of the resident tax payers of Road District No. 32, Washington County, Oregon, is hereby called, and will be held at Metzger Schoolhouse in said Road District No. 32, Washington County, Oregon, on the 6th day of November, 1928, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock P. M. of said day, to discuss the advisability of levying a special or additional road tax in said district, to determine what, if any county roads or portions thereof in said road district shall be improved, in any special manner, and the character and extent of such improvement or improvements they shall make thereon, and to levy such special or additional tax, not to exceed ten mills on the dollar, on all taxable real and personal property in said road district, as a majority of such resident tax payers of said road district shall deem advisable for the purpose of raising money with which to defray the expense of such special improvement or improvements in said Road District No. 32, Washington County, Oregon.


