RESOLUTIONS PASSED BY WASHINGTON CO. TEACHERS

Whereas the Superintendent and School Board of Hillsboro have kindly given the use of their high school building to the teachers of the county; be it Resolved, that we, the teachers of Washington County in Institute assembled, express to them our gratitude for the use of the same.

Resolved, that we extend our appreciation to our State Superintendent J. A. Churchill, instructors and musicians for the very profitable and enjoyable institute.

Resolved, that we express our appreciation for the efficient and faithful efforts put forth by our County Superintendent, N. A. Frost, to advance the interests of education in Washington County.

Resolved, that the Industrial Club work be encouraged and promoted by the teachers as far as practicable in their respective localities and that we recommend to the County Court that they make such appropriations as shall be necessary to secure available aid from the state and Federal Government to maintain a regular county club leader all or a part of the year.

Resolved, that the thrift campaign and the Americanization plan of the state department, as outlined in the course of study, be fully indorsed and each teacher be strongly urged to support these and to cooperate in every way possible in making these measures successful.

Resolved, that we hereby declare our intention to further debate and declamation in our several schools; that we are favorable to inter-scholastic contests of a forensic nature; that we approve the plan of having a county field and forum day in which the grammar and high schools of the county may meet together for final trials in declamation, debate and field events, and other appropriate activities; and that the county superintendent appoint a committee of three members to put this resolution into operation.

Resolved, that we, the teachers of Washington County, support our County Organization by attending a majority of the meetings held this year.

Resolved, that since it is the duty of the schools to be in touch with the national program of education, that our interests will be best served by becoming affiliated as a county unit with the National Association.

Resolved, that we believe in an adequate salary for teachers to the extent that they may live comfortably and make a saving; that we stand for legislation that will insure efficiency in the teaching profession to the end that the teacher may be worthy of such salary.

Further, that the Washington Coun-

ty Institute in assembly petitions the State Teachers' Association to further such a constructive program; Further, that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the press and the secretary of the State Teachers' Association.

Resolved, that we recommend to and petition our state legislature to advance the salaries of the State Superintendent to \$5000; and that of the county superintendent be at least \$2400, and further that a copy of this resolution be sent to the state legislative committee on salaries.

Resolved, that we are favorable to the establishment of a teachers' employment bureau by the State Department of Education under laws enacted by the state legislature; and that this resolution be presented to the State Association at its annual meeting.

BIG TIME PROMISED FOR ARMISTICE DAY

American Legion and G. A. R. Combine Efforts to Make Day Memorable for Local Citizens.

Elaborate plans are under way whereby Forest Grove will celebrate Armistice Day, November 11th, with a day filled to overflowing with joy and pleasure.

The big celebration will begin with the grand parade at 9:30 a. m., with the following lineup: Marshal of the day, Speakers of the day, State G. A. R. rifle and drum corps, local G. A. R., the big horse-drawn cannon, Spanish American war veterans, World war veterans, Boy Scouts, pupils of the Central school, pupils of the Lincoln school, students of the High school, students of Pacific University, Commercial Club, Fire department, Woman's Relief Soldiers' and Sailors' Memorial association, Woman's Club, Automobile section. See that you are in the right place and be sure that you are there. Tell every one else and see that they are in line.

The parade will form on Third Avenue south and march over the following route: North on Main Street to Pacific Avenue, East on Pacific Avenue to College Way, North on College Way to First Avenue north, West on First Avenue to A Street, South on A Street to Pacific Avenue, East on Pacific Avenue to College Way, North on College Way to First Avenue north, West on First Avenue to Main Street, South to the center of the block where the parade will halt and Mayor Hoffman will proceed to turn over the keys of the city, promptly at 10:55. This will be responded to by the signing of the Armistice celebration, to consist of as much noise as it is possible to make. Be sure that you are equipped with a noise making instrument and that you, and every one else make as much noise as possible.

At 11:15 the big cannon will be mounted with an impressive ceremony.

SALES OVER HALF MILLION DOLLARS

lously as money makers, brought to members of the Association this year, \$2,142.70, which to a large extent was pick-up money. One variety sold for \$3.90 a bushel.

Brief cherries valued at \$15,480 have been sold and shipped by the Association, every dollar of which would have been lost on account of the unusual rains during the picking season. The Oregon Growers, at the critical time, took these cracked cherries, dried and prepared them for shipment, and marketed them for the \$15,480.

Both white and black cherries were sold this season by the Association for 15 cents a pound, and this is also a matter of record that no other growers association in the state secured for its members such a favorable price.

The total amount of cherries marketed by the Oregon Growers, according to the October 7 statement was for this season the sum of \$115,566.12. The Royal Anne easily led with sales of \$93,015.97 while the Lambert and Bing pool brought in \$24,068.83.

With sales already running more than half a million dollars up to October 7 this season, and also taking into consideration favorable prices received from all reports there is a feeling of satisfaction and confidence among members of the Association.
