It is highly important that you inform yourself or yourself on this important matter and be prepared to register an honest and sound opinion. The Times does not seek to advise in this important matter. It is willing to let the sober judgment of the people settle all such matters. But it has this suggestion to offer. We have an excellent school. It is the best investment that we can make and any consideration of dollars and cents is insignificant by comparison with the proper training of future citizens. The attendance at our high school proves that we have not only an excellent high school but that our grade school is doing the right sort of work and that the grade schools of the surrounding districts are looking to Beaverton for the furtherance of the good work they are doing. Shall we fail in that trust?

We do not seek to tell you how to vote. But we do suggest that you know fully what you are voting on before casting your vote. Go to the schools if you have not been there recently. See what they are doing. Talk with the members of the Board. Learn of their plans, the needs of the school and the actual facts of increased costs. Then bear in mind that other schools are raising their budgets and that few towns surrounding Beaverton have schools to

compare at all with ours when relative population is taken into consideration. Don't let the budget fall for lack of interest.

SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET

To the Clerk of School District No. 48, Washington County, Oregon: Following is a statement of the estimated amount of money needed

by the district during the fiscal year beginning on June 21st, 1920, and ending on June 30, 1921. This budget is made in compliance with Section 217 of the School Laws of 1917, and includes the estimated amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, special district tax, and all other moneys of the district.

BUDGET

The amount of money to be raised by this special tax is more than the amount raised by special school district tax in the year immediately preceding this, plus six per cent. It is necessary to raise this additional amount by special levy for the following reasons: To provide for two extra teachers in grade school and two in High School; for increase in teachers' salaries; for funds for additional furniture and equipment; for increased cost maintenance of Public Schools.
