Jeff Watson et al. won their suit against Washington Cables in circuit court last week and secured a verdict for \$40 in addition to the judgment of Cables from disputed land.

James McPoland has filed suit in Circuit court to get possession of 66 bushels of hops valued at \$7698, which are now in a Sharrow warehouse of T. A. Lively & Co. He claims that the company came into possession of the hops without his consent and has refused to deliver them on his demand. He thinks \$500 damages will make things about right if he gets his hops back again.

John Wunderlich gave a note to the Oregon Moline Plow Co., on Feb. 2, 1920, for \$753, of which \$711.42 is still due, according to their complaint filed in circuit court.

Because W. E. Caterlin found a tractor badly worn for which he gave W. E. Gregg a valuable consideration, expecting to receive a tractor in good working order and suited to his needs on his Yamhill County ranch, he sues for recovery of \$850. The tractor deal was made last October and Caterlin is still paying bills for repairs on the tractor, he alleges.

H. J. Falby got merchandise from the Hillsboro Mercantile Co. to the amount of \$63.51 for which he never paid, alleges the company in a suit to collect.

Olis Sipp bought a Cole Eight. It was a beautiful car and he enjoyed it so much that he forgot to pay E. L. Perkins a balance of \$1165 on the purchase price, according to the suit filed by the automobile dealer recently.

C. A. Ellwell, formerly of this county, was found guilty of arson by an Oregon City jury recently. He is charged with setting fire to his store at Jennings Lodge. Mrs. Ellwell sustained fractures of the hip and wrist while escaping from the building.

John Campbell, native of Ireland, 63 years of age, long a resident of Canada, 30 years in this state and 13 years in the county, died at his home near here November 7. He is survived by a widow and two sons.

MacDonald Potts, Canadian by birth, Business Manager of the Portland Journal, and Washington County resident was the leading figure in naturalization day in the circuit court last week when twelve new citizens were added to Uncle Sam's family, six applications were continued and five were rejected. Cass E. Walker, of Seattle, was the government examiner and is a new man to Washington County. Mr. Potts was the son of a Civil War soldier, who later saw service in the British Army in India and then settled at Victoria, B. C., before coming to Oregon. At the time of the elder Potts' death, a search for papers to establish his citizenship failed to disclose whether his allegiance was to Uncle Sam or John Bull, so Mr. Potts made formal application for citizenship, and his efforts came to a successful conclusion last Wednesday. **"THIS IS A MISTLAND ORCHARD"**

Members of the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association will receive sometime this fall a beautiful colored enamel sign, with the above wording. These signs are to be posted over the approaches to orchards owned by members of the Oregon Growers.

C. I. Lewis, of the Association, has been working on signs that will not only be attractive from an artistic standpoint, but will be so colored that the wording may be easily read by passing tourists, as well as by home folks.

The signs are to be about 15 by 20 inches, painted on enamel in order to make them weather proof, and attractive enough in colors to be easily noticed. It is probable that the background will be black, with a large triangle covering most of the sign in orange color. Over this orange and black will be lettering in white, that can be easily read.

Incidentally, with the Mistland sign over the entrance to an orchard, the owner thereof will be doing his part in advertising Mistland products and letting the world know that he is a member of the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association.

**CHERRIES BRING GOOD RETURNS FOR GROWERS**

Dried cherries valued at \$15,450 have been sold and are being shipped to the east by the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association, every dollar of which would have been lost to the growers in the valley, had not the Association bought them when badly cracked.

As every one knows, the unusual rains during the cherry picking season and the large crop, threatened many cherry growers with a serious loss. At this critical time, the Oregon Growers stepped in, bought the cracked cherries that would have been an absolute loss, dried them and after preparing them for shipment, found a market.

The total amount received for sales of cherries this season, according to the October statement, amounted to \$18,566.12, which includes all sales from the Willamette and Umpqua valleys.

The Royal Ance cherry easily leads all others with sales valued at \$93,015.97. The Lambert and Bing pool brought in \$24,068.83, while the May Duke cherry stands at the bottom of the list, with returns of \$2.66.

Last year the Red Cross aided more than 30,000 victims of unavoidable disaster in 150 communities.
