CROP WASTE HEAVY

More than a hundred million dollars are lost in Oregon and other states by failure to use economically the corn stover and straw which the used crops were taken. Use of these by-products as feed and bedding for livestock would greatly increase the profits of farming, says the O. A. C. farm management department. About one-third of all straw grown in the country is used to a disadvantage either by burning or plowing under directly. Its best use is through livestock—dairy cows and hogs, and sheep, especially.
