to be held on Monday of next week, December 13th, the only alternative the city council will have in order to meet the increased demands made upon the city treasury, will be the increasing of the rates for water and light very materially, possibly fifty per cent, which will hit everybody in town a very hard blow, as but few people are not either water or light users. It will mean adding at least one-half to the present rates to every consumer of water and light in city or country.

By the adoption of the new charter it is pointed out that additional revenue may be obtained as the city indebtedness may be increased to not to exceed \$250,000. The new charter also provides that the city council may levy a special assessment of five mills in order to cover an emergency. Aside from this item and the manner of improving sidewalks, which the new charter provides may be done as street paving is now done and the owners may have ten years in which to pay assessments, the charters are much alike. —Forest Grove News-Times.
