**NOT ALL AGREED ON SKYLINE BOULEVARD**

Boosters for Cornell Road Object to Report Given in Times Last Week.

It seems that the Times was misinformed last week as to some points of the Highway Meeting held at Cedar Mills and numerous protests have come to this office regarding the report made. The Times writer was not present at the Highway meeting and accepted as correct the report of the meeting sent us. It seems that not all are agreed and that the Association under a... supposes the meeting was held... the Cornell road as the following resolution would show:

**RESOLUTION**

Passed by Executive Committee of the Portland-Astoria Inland Loop Highway Association.

Whereas, The Portland-Astoria Inland Loop Association, comprising an approximate paid up membership of one thousand people, in and contiguous to the towns included in the proposed route, namely, the towns of Cedar Mill, Beavany, North Plains, Rog, Banks, Manning, Buxton, Scotts, Vernonia, Mist, Berkenfield, Olney and Astoria, are advised that the ultimate plans of the State Highway Commission is to construct an inland Loop to Astoria, and, Whereas, The territory above named has at the present time no highway whereby the many residents may take their products to market, and by reason of this lack are suffering constantly to a financial loss, and, Whereas, This territory, as before named, comprises one of the most productive sections of the state, and has unlimited undeveloped resources that only await the building of a permanent highway to bring this great wealth to the use of the people of the state, and, Whereas, This proposed road leads through what is known as the "Beaver Creek Pass," with an 800 foot lower route to the Nehalem valley, and practically parallel with the Eckles Railroad from Hillsboro to Vernonia, this road now under process of
