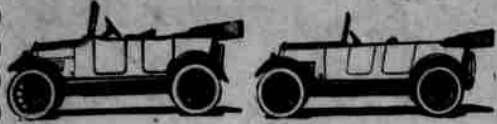

STARVING CHILDREN MUST RECEIVE SUCCOR

County Meeting at Hillsboro Not Well Attended—County Seat is Planning Organization.

The banking district of Forest Grove has been apportioned something like \$2500 as its quota of the relief fund that is to be raised by this state for the starving children of Europe. While we have not been able to learn who will have charge of the local drive we are quite sure that this prosperous community will be willing and ready to do its part when the solicitors call. With prosperity and plenty at hand everywhere the helpless children should not go unremembered at this Christmas season.

At the county meeting which was called at Hillsboro Wednesday Forest Grove had no representative. Only about six or seven were present at the meeting and Hillsboro organized by empowering Mayor Wall to appoint the proper committee. J. A. Thornburgh was originally appointed chairman for Washington County but could not serve. It is now up to Forest Grove to organize and do her part of this imperative work.

Who will take the matter in hand? "I'll buy the life of a child until next harvest."

Let America entertain at Christmas dinner as many children of Europe as they can afford as their little invisible guests.

These appeals from Herbert Hoover, Chairman of the European Relief Council, promise Oregon's initial appeal for \$250,000 to be raised between December 19 and 25, as a part of a nation-wide effort to save the lives of 3,500,000 of Europe's baby war victims.

Enlisted in the emergency organization recruited under the impetus of the powerful appeal within a week of Robert E. Smith, State Director, and his assistants, Art Liberty Loan, Red Cross, Knights of Columbus, Jewish Relief Association, Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A. and many other workers. Appeals from the head of each organization addressed to the people of the state read as follows:

L. Allen Lewis, Red Cross: "In the gradual appearance of reality now rapidly increasing after all these unreal years I am looking forward to seeing strikingly illustrated in the complete response to this appeal at this time for the helpless children abroad. Surely a feeling of obligation will arise and real generosity will now take the place of extravagant donation which undoubtedly disappeared. When such an exponent of common sense altruism as Mr. Hoover has been at all times, both in word and deed, comes forward now with this appeal, there can be no doubt but there is need of the request and an obligation for all of us to respond."

Edward Cookingham, Director Liberty Loan Campaign: "There is not a heart in Oregon hard enough to withhold the money that will buy food and save the lives of Europe's baby war victims."

J. F. Daly, Knights of Columbus: "The great generous heart of America will not fail to respond to the cry of several millions of starving children for food."

M. S. Hirsch, President Jewish Relief Association: "Your families are safe and comfortable. Can you consistently celebrate 'Peace on Earth and Good Will to Men,' knowing that millions of children are starving, without doing your bit for their relief?"

H. W. Stone, General Secretary Y. M. C. A.: "It would be nothing less than a tragedy for the young men of Oregon not to respond to the needs of the starving children of Europe at this time."

Mrs. W. D. Wheelwright, Y. W. C. A.: "American women will not be truly American until they learn to help and serve all suffering mankind." Oregon will nearly suspend Christmas activities in order to save the lives of starving infant millions in Europe. In the midst of this state's well fed comfort has suddenly been

Mrs. Banks Passes Away

Grandma Banks has gone to her reward. Nancy Isabelle Banks died at the family home at Banks, Dec. 7th, 1936, after a year of lingering poor health which ended in pneumonia, which she suffered from the last few days. FINAL INSTALLATION OF NEW MACHINERY FINISHED
Final installation of new machinery is announced by the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association in its packing plants at Scotts Mills, Salem, Dallas, Sutherlin, Yamhill, Forest Grove, and Myrtle Creek. This includes new processing machines of the latest type and grading machinery with almost double the capacity of the old ones.
In the three largest fruit markets of the world, the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association, with offices at Salem, Oregon, has topped the market in sales of Oregon pears, this season. Winter Nells sold in London for \$6.30 a box f. o. b. New York City. Rose pears sold in New York City for \$7.38 a box for extra fancy and in Chicago for \$7.30 a box. A car lot of D'Anjou sold in Chicago at an average of \$4.74 a box.
Oregonians are often a little touchy and side step the fact that it rains during the winter months. Now the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association is claiming that the people of the state should be proud of its rains and mists, as it is these conditions that make Oregon fruits and berries. Hence the name "Mistland" is very appropriate in advertising Oregon's horticultural products.
Apple syrup is the latest in the syrup line and is now offered to the public through the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association. It is manufactured at the Eugene plant. The acid has been removed by a chemical process and now one may buy apple syrup especially adapted to cooking purposes.
The loganberry business is picking up in the Willamette Valley. The State Tax Commission reports for 1936 an acreage of 5,367 in the state. The Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association estimates that within a few years there will be 10,000 acres in loganberries in the Willamette valley alone. This year loganberries sold for 13 cents a pound, last year 8 1/2 and 9 cents, two years ago, 8 cents a pound.
Although the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association was not organized for business until January 1, 1936, already it has a membership in excess of 1,600 and controls 28,000 acres of fruit and berries. The head office is at Salem.
For the first time in the history of the state, English walnuts are being graded. Growers are sending their crops to the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association plants at Salem and Yamhill. Within another year the Association hopes to introduce walnut cracking machines and also machinery for washing, drying, and grading.
It is estimated by officials of the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association that already there was 65,000 acres planted in prunes in western Oregon. Just a few years ago the acreage was 12,000. The crop went out about 65 per cent this year on account of unreasonable rains, and is now estimated at 25,000,000 pounds.
