IS MOTHER'S DAY

The second Sunday in May—May 8—will be Mother's day, when the wearing of a white flower in remembrance of mother will be the order of the day.

Governors of states and mayors of cities in past years have issued special proclamations endorsing the purpose and recommending the general observance of the day and it is probable that Governor Olcott will issue a proclamation immediately preceding the date.

The rules of the day are as follows: "Wear a white flower (preferably a white carnation), or your mother's favorite flower."

"If away from home write mother a love letter, send her a telegram or use the long distance telephone."

"Display the flag in honor of our patriotic women, especially mothers whose sons have rendered service to our country."

"Remember the sick and unfortunate in hospitals, homes or in prisons."

It was in 1908 that an appreciative daughter desired to commemorate the anniversary of her mother's death. It was not only the thought of laying some flowers on her mother's grave, but it occurred to her that it would be a beautiful tribute to all mothers, the living as well as the dead, if their children on a given day would unite in the simple wearing of a white flower and thus make Mother's day universal. The idea swept over the country and was also welcomed in other lands. Thus the observance of Mother's day was born. The purpose of Mother's day as conceived by Miss Anna Jarvis, of Philadelphia, with whom it originated, is a day in which all lands as one nation may unite in honor of mother.

FRED HARDING PROCLAIMS  
MAY 30 MEMORIAL DAY

Calling upon the nation to pay homage to its hero dead, President Harding has issued the following Memorial day proclamation:

Whereas, the nation has been conceived in prayer and devotion by men and women who were moved under God to found a nation where principles of right should form a lasting cornerstone, and,

"Whereas, these principles purchased at the price of a great sacrifice have been fostered by worthy posterity; and,

"Whereas, a great war has lately laid its costly demands upon our land;

Now, therefore, I, Warren G. Harding, president of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim Monday, the thirtieth day of May, a day already freighted with sacred and stimulating memories, a day of public memorial. I invite my fellow citizens fittingly to pay homage on this day to a noble and who sleep in homeland, beneath the sea or on foreign field, that we who survive might enjoy the blessing of peace and happiness, and to that end that liberty and justice, without which no nation can exist, shall live forever."

Government Harpess

Pig Club

The Washington County Bank Pig Club has purchased for its members five pure bred Poland China pigs. This club has eleven members and was organized by W. L. Moore and Bob Banks. Its members plan to make exhibit at the Banks Hog & Dairy Show this fall.

Seed Corn

There are many inquiries for Minnesota 13 seed corn. It appears though there is a good opportunity offered in this county for some farmers to make this line of agricultural production a regular business. Namely, that of producing a certified Minnesota 13 seed corn for sale to farmers in the Willamette Valley.

A communication from the Oregon Wool and Mohair Growers Association states that they have arranged to secure for members the regulation four-pound wool bags at 35¢ apiece, f. o. b. Portland in 100 sack lots. Fleece weight at 28¢ per pound. Less than 100 sack lots at 35¢ apiece, and twine 28¢ per pound.

These prices apply to members of the Oregon Wool and Mohair Growers Association only. If you want to purchase sacks and twine through this medium, send your order with remittance in full to the Farm Bureau Office at Hillsboro, in care of me. Make checks payable to the Oregon Wool and Mohair Growers Association.

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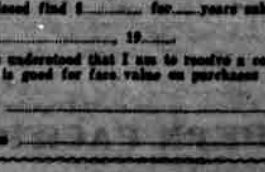
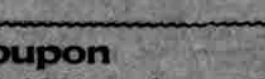
