Home Town Helps

MOVE FOR "BETTER CITIES"

Active Campaign Begun in Oklahoma—Cash Offered for the "Best Home Town."

It looks as if it were going to be a good year for children in Oklahoma. Following the example of Kansas in instituting a "Better cities campaign," the Rotarian club of Shawnee has offered a cash prize of \$2,500 to any middle class city in Oklahoma which by November 15, 1921, will score the highest as a good place in which to bring up a family, Shawnee itself being now an example in this respect.

Kansas started it. An active campaign in that state to determine which of its cities was best adapted for the bringing up of the coming generation was held during 1915-1917. There were 85 cities in the list of entries, each endeavoring to show cause why all parents should register as citizens within its precincts. Winfield won the first prize of \$1,000, and Oklahoma, being the next outdoor neighbor of Kansas, was not to be outdone in the way of indicating what its cities could offer for family residence.

The idea of a better-cities campaign began with William A. McKeever of the State University of Kansas. In order to make the local campaign more effective, the state board of education urged that a control committee consisting of representatives from the home, the school, the church, and the community be appointed to help the town to set its best foot forward as a better city for better children and better parents.

There is an official scorecard, which provides ten points for judging. Facilities for playgrounds, health, recreation, moral safeguards, sociability, religion, service and housing. PREVENTING DECAY OF WOOD

Forest Products Laboratory Gives Some Valuable Hints to Both Builders and Architects.

The chances of infection of timber by wood-destroying fungi, while it is under the care of an architect in the structure may be greatly reduced by following the hints issued by the forest products laboratory, Madison, Wis.

The material should be stored on well-drained ground, where standing water or overflow water may not reach it. All rotting or infected debris should be collected and burned. Sound lumber should not be piled along with infected lumber. Weeds should be removed from about the piles to allow a good air circulation.

The foundation should be of a material free from decay and should be high enough to allow good ventilation beneath the stacks. In humid regions the stack should be on foundations 18 to 24 inches from the ground. Wood treated with antiseptics, concrete brick or other durable material should be chosen for foundation. The foundations should be built so that the piles will slope approximately one inch to every foot of length.

In most regions lumber should not be close piled in the open, but should be thick. Lateral spacing is also very desirable. Roofing or cover boards should be used on the piles and should extend over for several inches in front and back.

Wherever infected or decayed material is observed either in the piles, or foundations, or the sheds, it should be removed immediately to prevent contamination of sound material. The material in close contact with the infected material should be carefully inspected to detect decay, and, if infected, an antiseptic solution should be applied. Water-soluble salts, such as sodium fluoride, mercuric chloride, zinc chloride or copper sulphate are recommended.

What Every City Needs.

The toilers are too busy doing the work of the fault finders, and they cannot stop to explain. Turner, who love others better than they love their own ease and quiet and spend themselves in unselfish endeavor. No man gets the name of civic patriot by doing things simply for himself. He must serve the public interest and the general good, not his own pocket; while the range of his charity may cover the whole world, it should, to the homely phrase, "come home to roost" in his own town.

59TH COMMENCEMENT IS A SUCCESSFUL ONE

Events of Closing Days of College

Are Largely Attended.—Unusual Interest Manifested.

Pacific University's fifty-ninth graduating class received their A. B. degrees Wednesday afternoon before probably the largest crowd that has ever attended the commencement exercises here. The program for the afternoon included "March Pontifical" by Erna Alice Taylor during which the faculty and seniors took their places; invocation by the Rev. Mr. Blair; "Pilgrim's Song" (Tasche allowsky) sung by Mrs. Virginia Spencer Hutchinson, and violin selections from Bach and Halvorsen by Professor William Wallace Graham. Mr. Hill gave an encouraging, though brief report, on the campaign for endowment.

The main feature of the program was the commencement address given by Dr. Harold L. Bowman pastor of the First Presbyterian church in Portland. His subject was "Three Philosophies of Life," and he showed the ineffectuality of the philosophies of two poets, Omar Khayyam and Matthew Arnold, when compared with that of the third poet, Browning. It was a masterful address and one not soon to be forgotten by the hearers.

Degrees were conferred by President Clark upon Sumiyoshi Arima, of Seattle; Irene Bihrey, of Portland; Willis Cady, of Beaverton; Myrtle Fern, of Cherry Grove; Thomas Fowler, of Rainier; Willis Hines, Arthur Jones, Margaret Marsh, Margaret Morgan, Evelyn Patton, all of Forest Grove; Harry Romig, of Oregon City, and John Stovall, of Philomath. Mrs. Elizabeth Webster Budd received a diploma in voice. Honors went to several: Arthur Jones, Margaret Marsh and Harry Romig, graduated "magna cum laude" and are entitled to the oak leaf pin awarded to those whose work is of this degree. Evelyn Patton graduated "cum laude." Harry Romig received an "honor" in mathematics, also.

First honor students, including all who make a grade of "A" in every subject taken, were Agnes Fenenga and Mabel Johnson (Astoria) for the Freshman class; Thelma Mills, Nellie Walker and Lois Payne (St. Helens) for the Sophomore class; Arthur Jones and Margaret Marsh for the seniors. The Witham cup, awarded for greatest progress in debate during the year, went to Mary Baker, of Portland.

The large attendance was due partly to the fact that alumni members were out as never before. The local members served a luncheon at noon for the out-of-town guests who had been students at college here, and a very interesting picture gallery showing the ancient, medieval and modern photographs of members of the Pacific family, was arranged by the librarian, Miss Lottie Peters.

The trustees had their annual meeting and luncheon Wednesday morning and noon. There was only one member of the board not present at the meeting. Mr. Hill was present and campaign plans were foremost in the topics discussed.

The Alumni business meeting and dinner Wednesday evening closed the commencement week. The business meeting was held in Herck Hall and the officers chosen for the coming year were President, C. Witham, of Portland; Vice President, Mrs. Price, of Forest Grove; Secretary, Treasurer, Samuel Lawrence, of Portland. The Alumni look forward to a busy year in the interests of the Campaign.

Mr. Hill was made an Honorary member of the alumni and in a few words to the Association emphasized the need for the loyal support of the Alumni in the Campaign.

Following this meeting all adjourned to the Congregational church where the Congregational ladies society served a lovely dinner to about one hundred and thirty people. The new alumni president took charge of the program following the dinner. Instead of the usual toasts, the classes were divided in groups of three and each gave a stunt. Preceding this, Mr. Hill gave a short talk and the class of '21 sang their senior song and gave some yells. The quartet also sang. The classes of '18, '19, and '20 gave an amusing interpretation of a scene from "Midsummer Night's Dream." '17, '16 and '15 presented an index with sports, locals, editorials, and society items.

Most worthy of mention was the stunt put on by '08, '09 and '10, entitled "The Bridge of the Gods," in which a council fire of the great chiefs was called to discuss the campaign of Pacific, and to hear the dream of Snoqualmie.

The group of '05, '06 and '07 were not all present so in place of the planned stunt, Mr. D. D. Bump told of some interesting adventures of boxer. Thus ended one of the best Alumni dinners ever held, and a commencement week, which had been much enjoyed by the P. U. family and friends.
