—Grandma Aikens of Walla Walla, Washington, has been visiting with her daughter, Mrs. Will Smith. Mrs. Aikens is past ninety years old and has for several years been living at the old peoples' home at Walla Walla.

—While the prune crop in western Oregon may average about 50 per cent of a crop, there is one man, member of the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association at Eugene, who is in luck this year. He reports that his crop is so large that he will be obliged to use props to keep the limbs from breaking. His name is Lauritz N. Miller.

—A traveling man who recently called at the office of the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association said that a Seattle hotel charges 25 cents for one Oregon baked apple with cream, 25 cents for just a few prunes and then 20 cents for a serving of half a grape fruit. He thought something was wrong when three Oregon prunes or one Oregon baked apple should cost more than a serving of half a Florida grape fruit.

—The total cost of delivering a box of apples in New York City from Oregon is 97 cents. If the railroads should reduce the freight 10 cents a box, it would mean a saving of \$5,000,000 to growers in the northwest.

—The Oregon Growers' Cooperative Association recently signed up 1,000 acres of the most productive fruit and vegetable land within eight miles of The Dalles, controlled by 80 growers who recently became members of the Association. The packing plant at The Dalles, one of the best in the state, has been purchased by the Association, the transfer being financed by the new members in The Dalles district. Already shipments are being made. With the new membership at The Dalles, the Oregon Growers' Cooperative Association has grown from 157 members in 1919 to the present membership of 1718. When organized the Association had control of 9,000 acres. It now has 30,592 acres.

—Last Sunday being Mr. J. T. Fletcher's 81st birthday, his grandson, John Williams came and took Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher and Mr. and Mrs. W. L. McAttee out to the home of his daughter, Mrs. Thomas Williams, at Hillsboro, for a birthday dinner. CONTROL THE STABLE FLY

The numbers of stable flies can be kept down by caring properly for stable refuse and by properly stacking or otherwise disposing of straw in a way that will not make it attractive as a breeding place for the flies. Flies cause much distress among animals and at times heavy losses. Control measures are described by the United States Department of Agriculture in Farmers' Bulletin 1097, The Stable Fly: How to Prevent its Annoyance and its Losses to Live Stock.
