STATE WIDE HUMANE WORK

The Oregon State Humane Society
was one of the few organizations that
received appropriations to carry on
its work.
A new state law also requires teach-
ing of kindness to animals in every
public school of the state half an hour
each week.

Influential people have been placed
on the Board of Trustees who will
give the organization increased power
and influence in its fight against
cruelty to dumb animals and children.
The new members of the board in-
clude Manager W. S. Baker and Field
Representative Elliott of the State
Audubon Society; Mrs. Millie Trum-
bull, head of the Child Labor and Wel-
fare work; W. A. Dickson, principal
of one of the largest schools in Port-

land; County Sept. of Schools Alder-
man.
Hon. Wm. Hanley, of Burns, one of
the highest live stock men in the
state, has become interested and will
assist in extending the work of hu-
mane education in eastern Oregon.

LEARN TO SWIM

The law does not require anyone
to learn to swim, neither does it
force people who are not swimmers
to risk their lives on the water. But
as long as there are rivers, lakes
and seas on this earth, people will
continue to avail themselves of the
pleasures they offer. Therefore,
common sense requires that every
man, woman and child who goes on
water or who ever expects to go the
water should learn the art of swim-
ming, at least to a degree where they
could, in case of necessity, keep
themselves afloat for a short period,
says an exchange.

Inability to swim is suicidal in
many cases; sometimes it is even
murderous. What of the man, who
being unable to swim, grabs hold of
a swimmer and drags the latter down
to a watery grave? Did not the in-
ability of the first result in the mur-
der of the swimmer?

But leaving out of consideration
every law but the first law of na-
ture, does not desire for self-preser-
vation demand of everyone the ability
to swim? It does unless one is sure
that he will never get near enough to
deep water to make swimming neces-
sary to save his life. Even then
he may fall into a well.

If people would only learn to at
least keep themselves afloat in the
water for a few minutes, thousands
upon thousands of lives would be saved
every year.

Some days ago, the editor of the
Wheeler Ore. newspaper asked Gov-
ernor Olcott if it would not be in-
keeping with the spirit of the times
to designate a week as "Subscribe for
your home paper." The Wheeler
publisher explained that "the news-
papers have, during the past year
been called upon to support innumera-
ble drives to urge people to eat
prunes, fish, apples and rice, etc. The
editors have generously and gladly
supported every cause and no small
part of the success of the various ven-
tures is due to the newspapers. We
believe that it is about time to desig-
nate a week as "Subscribe for your
home paper week." The governor
saw the logic but simply said that he
was of the opinion that every
week should be "subscribe for your
home paper week." We trust that
the governor did not pass this im-
portant matter as a mere pious duty.

Genius is only the power of mak-
ing continuous efforts. The line be-
tween failure and success is so fine
