Set Forth Truths

Jefferson did not need to create the Declaration. He had but to express the sentiments which were common to the mass of freedom-loving men. In after years, when enemies declared that the authorship of the Declaration of Independence displayed a lack of originality and that every idea in it was "hacked" and was to be found in half a dozen earlier publications, Jefferson replied with perfect wisdom and fairness, "I did not consider it as any part of my charge to invent new ideas altogether and to offer no sentiment which had been expressed before."

It is this fact that has led some historians to allege that Thomas Paine may have had a hand in the writing of the Declaration of Independence, for without doubt there were expressed in some of his previous writings ideas of liberty and justice that of necessity animated many of the sentiments embodied in the document as written by Jefferson. But there seems to be no adequate foundation for the truth of

the statement that Paine had any direct hand in its framing. Jefferson set forth in precise terms the reason for the colonies' withdrawal from British rule, in the classic with which every schoolboy is familiar. The original draft in his handwriting is now in the State department archives at Washington. It shows trifling alterations, interlined in the handwriting of Franklin and Adams; otherwise it came before Congress precisely as Jefferson wrote it.

Jefferson's own account of the drafting of the Declaration bears out this opinion. According to his statement, when the committee came together he was pressed by his colleagues to undertake the draft; that he did so; that when he prepared it he submitted it to Dr. Franklin and Mr. Adams, separately, requesting their corrections, "which were two or three only, interlined in their own handwritings; that the report in this shape was adopted by the committee and a 'fair copy' written out by Jefferson, was then read.

OUR P. U. BOYS WILL PLAY JAPANESE JULY 12

Plans Being Made for Big Game—Will Open Gladstone Chautauqua Ball Season.

Two of the greatest games in which Pacific University ever has been called upon to participate, will be those with Waseda University, of Tokio, Japan, the first to be played on the regular baseball grounds in Portland and the second at the Gladstone Chautauqua, opening the baseball series there on July 12.

Billy Stepp, sporting editor of the Portland News, will umpire both games.

It is planned to have more than 100 autos from Washington county, the towns of Forest Grove, Hillsboro and Cornelius participating in a parade thru Portland on the way to the grounds. It is requested that all cars be placarded with Forest Grove and Pacific University banners and pennants that the towns and the university may make themselves known.

President Hollis, of the Forest Grove Chamber of Commerce, Monday night appointed a committee to take charge of arrangements of having the autos leave here shortly after noon on Monday, July 11, making the trip to Portland en masse. Dr. Ralph Mills, C. A. Brodersen and Mayor Schultz make up the committee.

It is probable that Mayor Schultz will proclaim a half-holiday for July 11, which promises to be one of the biggest days this summer for Forest Grove and other Washington county towns, as well as for Pacific University and particularly its baseball team.

Paul Abraham, who has charge of getting together the Pacific U. boys and getting them out to practice, declares that his aggregation of ball players will be ready when the umpires arrive. "Play Ball." They will be practicing together all next week, up to the date of the first game. The personnel of the team as at present lined up by Mr. Abraham includes:

Tom Fowler (c); "Jas" Hoar (p); "Quincey" Adams (1b); Ralph Mills (2b); Jack Schell (ss); Ernest Wolf (3b); William Harmon (rf); Henry Fliske (cf); Harold Sells (lf); Raymond Bryant, Leo Lucas, Lester Hughes and Fred Wolf, substitutes.

The Waseda University team has just covered America in a tour which has taken them from San Francisco to Chicago, where they first played a series of games with the University of Chicago, which carried off the honors. The Waseda boys, however, defeated Northwestern University at Evanston by the score of 17 to 2. One game was played. Harvard and Yale also defeated the Tokyo team in its homeward stretch and at present is playing a series of games with the University of Washington at Seattle. They will play four or five games with Japanese teams in and about Tacoma and Seattle, before coming south to meet P. U.

I. Oyama, secretary of the Japanese association of Oregon, will act as host for the Japanese team while in Portland, giving them a trip over the Columbia River Highway, as far as Multnomah Falls on the morning of their arrival in the metropolis. It is hoped that they may have the time to make a trip by auto to Forest Grove to visit the University as guests of the city and college officials.

In case the trip is made by auto it is planned to show the Japanese boys around Hillsboro and Forest Grove and other towns enroute if time will permit. This trip may be made on Tuesday morning, July 12, before they go to Gladstone, Ore., to play the second game against Pacific U. Though L. J. Frank, the new director of athletics of P. U., will have charge of the physical culture classes and will umpire the games at the Chautauqua, he will not umpire the games in which Waseda and Pacific play, it having been decided by Pacific and Mr. Oyama that both teams would prefer an outsider as umpire.

Considerable interest is being shown in the games in Portland, the baseball fans there being anxious to see a real game of baseball, something which they have not seen for many a moon, as the Portland team is still in the cellar position, and probably will remain there for some time to come.

P. U. GRADUATES EAGERLY SOUGHT AS TEACHERS

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BIG TIME PLANNED FOR VETERANS AT EUGENE

The boys of the local American Legion Post are planning on a big representation at the Third Annual State Convention of the American Legion, Department of Oregon, which is to be held at Eugene, July 1st and 2nd.

A great welcome is awaiting the veterans at Eugene.

Among the distinguished visitors will be Lemuel Bolles, National Adjutant.

The First State convention of the Women's Auxiliary will meet at the same time of the American Legion gathering.

101 posts of The American Legion represented by 280 representatives to the convention and 180 representatives of the Women's Auxiliary will be on hand at Eugene. It is expected that over 800 visitors will be in attendance from other counties than Lane county and many of the Legion posts will attend in large bodies.

Motoring will be the most popular route to the convention, although a reduced fare of one and one-half fare will be in effect in all points in Oregon over the S. P. & S. Ry., Union Pacific System and the Southern Pacific Railway.

City Attorney of Eugene will give the welcoming address, followed by John W. Inzer, National Chaplain of the American Legion, who has come from Chattanooga, Tenn., and Rev. William S. Gilbert, Chaplain of the Oregon Department American Legion and Ben W. Olcott, Governor of Oregon.

Important to the individual members, will be the two national speakers, John W. Inzer, Chaplain of the American Legion, being pronounced by the eastern press, one of the ablest speakers of today with Teddy Roosevelt, now Assistant Secretary of the Navy, toured the eastern states early in 1919 from the lakes to the gulf states, organizing state departments of the legion. Chaplain Inzer is speaking before Legion conventions all over the western and southern part of the country. Alvi M. Owsley, Assistant Director of the American Legion Commission will deliver the " keynote" speech of Americanism and outline to the legionnaires the duties of the members of the Americanism Commission and its future work.

It is believed the convention will give a new expression on the Japanese question, which is of vital importance to the Pacific Coast states.

On the immigration problem as a whole and action of better schools, Americanization, improvement of state and nation, the convention will hear Alvin M. Owsley, sent by the National Headquarters of the American Legion from Indianapolis.

Other questions to be acted upon by the convention will embrace, increased activity towards the assistance of the disabled; legion membership; revision of state constitution; selection of state officers and a state body; selection of 1922 meeting place.

The Portland delegation will seek to find the sentiment of the delegates on bringing the national convention of the American Legion to Portland in 1925, which would bring over 200,000 Legionnaires to Portland.

The Women's Auxiliary will perfect their permanent state organization, adoption of state constitution, policy for the ensuing year, dues, organization of auxiliary units, election of state officials and meeting place for 1922.

Of special interest will be the entertainment planned by the Eugene post. There will be street dancing, festivities, convention ball, a huge parade and special prizes listed, an excellent boxing card with the best of Southern Oregon talent billed, motorcycle and harness races with over \$1000 dollars in prizes to be given by

the judges to the winners and an Aero circus by the 51st Aero squadron. Among the entertainment features planned for the week, is a barbecue up the McKenzie to Nimrod, the visitors and Legionnaires being taken up the highway for 28 miles, stopping enroute to visit the State Game farm and then taken to the hatchery, where eating and speaking will be the order of the day.
