### Sunshine Letters From J.W. Barnes, Long Beach, California

Dear Editor: When I left Beaverton the last words my neighbor Mr. Davis said to me were; I wish you would gather some sunshine and send up to we people here at Beaverton so my articles written for The Owl, will always be headed Sunshine. We left Portland Dec. 2 at 8-45 under a dark foggy and cloudy day, until night through occasional showers passing those Cities you are so well acquainted with Salem, Albany, Eugene, Cottage Grove and on reaching Grants Pass at 10-30 that night when the train stopped we got off and caught a glimpse of a few scattering stars, peeping through the swiftly flying clouds, but not raining. The City was all aglow with electric lights that were modern in every detail as we wended our way to the Hotel Josephine we were inspired with the cleanliness and modern buildings of the City. Morning broke with a flame in the east that promised a gleam of the sun the air was crisp and fresh as it naturally would be at an altitude of 963 ft. above Sea level as the sun climbed slowly above mountain peaks apparently shy as a Maiden in her teens I grabbed an armful of sunshine and gave it a throw toward Beaverton but alas as it tipped the mountain peaks it was caught in a dark bank of clouds and was hid from view so when the train arrived at 8 we were again in the fog. Grants Pass is a Beautiful City setting like a jewel in the heart of a mt. on a level plain from three to four miles in diameter with sharp mt. peaks raising at an altitude of a thousand to 1500 ft. and in my opinion for a small City it has no equal on the Pacific slope in my next I will pick up the thread from Grants Pass. ### TREE FALLS ON CABIN

Close Call For Conley of Beaverton  
Wheeler O. L. M. Dudrey, track walker, and T. Monita, a Japanese workman on the P. R. and N. were instantly killed, and William Conley, section foreman, and K. Onogawa and M. Nishimma, laborers were seriously injured yesterday morning by a tree which fell across the house of Section Foreman Conley and the Japanese bunkhouse at mile post No. 40 on P. R. and N. Conley and Nishimma were badly crushed about the head and shoulders but will recover. The men were in the building when the tree fell. Dudrey and Conley were dressed and preparing breakfast, the Japanese workmen had not arisen and were caught in bed. A big fir tree standing about 100 ft. from the camps fell across both buildings demolishing them. Dudrey leaves a wife and one child. The Family of William Conley lives at Beaverton. Dr. Hawk, of Bay City, and nurses were rushed to Enright to which place the injured men were taken. An inquest was held over the dead men and the Coroner's jury decided that death was accidental.
