## CROSS Plains

GEORGE N. THOMAS

Mr. George N. Thomas died at his home one mile North of here last Saturday.

The last of 5 brothers and one sister Geo. N. Thomas was born in Coshocton Co. Ohio May 25, 1831. Married 1856 and moved to Ind. soon after. Moved to Mo. 1869 from Mo. Crossed the plains in 1880 with mule team arrived in Portland in Sept. the same year settled in Wash. Co 1881.

Mr. Thomas was an active member of Beaverton Grange No. 324. He served as School Director in Barnes District No. 57 for a number of terms, as director he was one of the best in Washington Co. as a citizen and neighbor, Mr. Thomas ranked among the highest. He leaves, to mourn his sad departure; two daughters Mrs. W. J. Butner and Mrs. J. E. Berst one son Mr. E. J. Thomas all residing here, and a host of friends.

## CIRCUIT COURT

In the Circuit Court last Wednesday Mr. Wm Wolf of Beaverton case came up Judge Campbell listened to the testimony on both sides and rendered a decision in favor of Mr. Wolf granting him the custody of his two children in a short time. Billy Wolf is the happiest man in the State of Oregon.

Dr. J. A. Baker of Gaston pleaded guilty in the Circuit Court of this county last Tuesday to selling liquor without a license and was fined \$500 on the first indictment. Upon payment of the fine Judge Campbell paroled him on 19 other indictments, pending good behavior. J. A. Baker was caught in the crusade started by Governor West last Fall.

George Naylor, indicted on a charge involving a woman, pleaded not guilty and his trial is set for April 2. Ed. Naylor, his brother, convicted of a like offense and fined \$150 a few weeks ago, again gave his bond the first of the week under another indictment.

## COUNTY COURT

County Court, Judge Reasoner and Commissioners Nyberg and Hanley, Saturday, adjourned the session of court over to Wednesday of this week, after a three and half days sitting.

The following business was transacted—Ordered that special road fund in District No. 12, turned over by ex-county clerk Bailey upon going out of office be turned into the Road district fund.

Ordered that the county road as per petitioners paring one-half of the damages assessed, said petitioners to have 30 days wherein to liquidate. Ordered that Raleigh Robinson, Ole Olson and Surveyor McGee survey and locate proposed County Road No. 368, petition of Robert Johnson and others.

Ordered that Frank Rowell, G. A. Plieth and Surveyor McGee view and locate proposed road No. 567, petition Tanner et als. Clerk Luce reported fees for February at \$572.15, and Recorder Perkins reported fees for same month at \$471.90.

## NEW R.R.

LINE TO NEWBERG

TIGARDVILLE, Or. March 28 (Special.) Citizens of this place are making an effort to have the proposed Newberg and McMinnville electric railway extended to this place, leaving the main line near Greenburg station.

The route considered runs through the Quigley Gap of Missionary Ridge, into a fertile, though undeveloped farming and small home district the Tualatin River Valley, which as yet has no railroad connection. A heavy passenger and freight business, it is believed, would reward the builders.

Through the effort of the Commercial Club, a petition has been signed by about 200 persons asking the establishment of a rural mail route from Tigardville to eliminate the inconvenience now experienced, of the farmers having their freight shipped to one point, while receiving their mail at another.
