TAXES COMING IN

Sheriff Reeves' office reports taxes collected at about \$280,000 for the rebate period ending Monday night. The sum collected would be practically the same as in 1912 but for the fact that the Southern Pacific Co. and P. R. & N. have protested against some of the road taxes. The S.P. offered a check for about \$20,000 while the P.R. & N. would go to about six or seven thousand.

These two amounts, had they been accepted, would have placed collections at the same figure as last year on rebate payments.

J.B. Eddy was out the first of the week, and as the sheriff would not accept it without the assent of the county board.

This was not forthcoming. The force is now busy taking in half payments and sending out receipts for money coming by mail on rebates.
