MEAT AND RICE COMBINATION

Excellent Method of Putting Daily "Leftovers" to Good Use is a Typical Italian Dish.

In ever the poorest of Italian homes the brown casseroles are in evidence. Failing one, however, any deep earthen or granite ware dish will answer. Wash thoroughly in two or three waters one cup rice. Drain, then throw into a kettle of boiling water with a teaspoonful salt. Boil rapidly for 15 or 20 minutes, until the rice is tender, drain and set back on the range or in the oven for the rice to swell and dry. Take one-third of the cooked rice and set aside and with the remainder line sides and bottom of the buttered casserole. To one pint cold minced meat—any sort preferred—add two well beaten eggs, two tablespoonfuls dried bread crumbs, a tablespoonful chopped parsley, a teaspoonful onion juice, two tablespoonfuls of melted butter, and salt, pepper and sweet herbs to season. Mix thoroughly, add gravy or stock to make rather moist, pack into the center of the casserole, cover the top with the reserved rice and cook for an hour. Serve with tomato sauce.

Take the heart, liver, tongue and a thick slice from one cheek of a pig and wash thoroughly, then put on the stove to cook with sufficient water to cover and salt to suit taste; when nearly done add one onion (chopped fine) and add pepper to suit taste and stove and drain, then run the meat through the food grinder (or chop real fine) and add pepper to suit taste and a little sage. Place in a granite kettle or dish and let cool. It is then ready for use.

GOLD IN THE HEAD

Is the First Chapter in the History of Chronic Disease.

A cold in the head is the first chapter in the history of disease and death. This has been so often repeated that there are few people indeed who have not witnessed many examples of it.

A cold in the head is rarely severe enough to confine a vigorous person to the house. As a rule, it ends in recovery without any treatment. This has led many people to regard a cold in the head as of no importance. It is a terrible mistake, however, to pass by a cold in the head as a trivial matter. Each case should be treated.

OJEDA FLEES TO UNITED STATES

Indians Capture Naco and Exterminate Garrison.

Guard of 15 Left to Cover Retreat Die Fighting—Feds Spike Guns and Destroy Supplies.

Naco, Ariz.—General Pedro Ojeda, commanding the remnants of his federal garrison of 300 troopers at Naco, Sonora, surrendered to the United States troops on border patrol here Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, after having withstood a siege of state troops which lasted for five days, and in which more than half his troops were killed.

The surrender was hastened by the attack on the federal garrison by the band of Yaqui Indians under General Alvaro Obregon, commanding state troops. The latter force at daybreak burst in on the little garrison and fought viciously. The dead on both sides have been estimated at 200, and the fortifications at Naco, Sonora, are veritable slaughter pens.

General Ojeda, true to his promise, refused to surrender. While the fighting was at its height he attempted to march across the border with his small band. The fire from the enemy was demoralizing, and Ojeda and his men ran and became scattered. Not even then did the firing from the rebels cease.

Captain H. A. Sievert, Company A, Ninth United States cavalry, ran alone to Ojeda's assistance.

The American officer grasped the Mexican general by the arm, and together they ran in a hail of lead to where an automobile was waiting.

Captain Figueroa, of the federal garrison, with 15 men, remained behind to cover General Ojeda's flight. One by one he and his fellows died in the barracks, surrounded by a horde of yelling, slaughtering Yaquis.

ATTEMPTS TO KILL ALFONSO

Anarchist Fires at Spanish King, Who Escapes Uninjured.

Madrid—For the third time in his reign, King Alfonso narrowly escaped Sunday from being the victim of an anarchist attempt against his life. Three shots were fired at the king in the streets of the capital by a native of Barcelona, Rafael Sanchez Allegro, who was immediately overpowered.

King Alfonso owes his escape to his courage, quickness and skilled horsemanship. Accompanied by his staff he was riding along the Calle de Alcalá, returning from the ceremony of swearing in recruits, when a man sprang from the sidewalk and seized the bridle of the king's horse with one hand, pointing a revolver point blank with the other. The king, realizing the situation with lightning rapidity, dug his spurs into his horse, which reared violently.

His quickness saved his life. The bullet, instead of burying itself in the king's breast, struck the horse. So close was the range that the king's left glove was blackened by the powder discharge.

Before the assailant was able to pull the trigger again a secret service man sprang upon him. The two men fell to the ground locked in each other's arms, struggling furiously. The assassin managed to free his revolver arm and fired two more shots in rapid succession, but the officer knocked his arm aside and the bullets flew harmlessly through the air.

Permit Denied Friedmann.

Washington, D. C.—Surgeon General Blue, of the public health bureau, told Dr. Friederich Franz Friedmann Saturday that until the exact nature of his tuberculosis vaccine and the method of its preparation had been revealed and the claims made for it substantiated by official tests and investigations, a license for its sale in interstate commerce could not be issued. This was the surgeon general's answer when the Berlin scientist asked what steps would be necessary for him to take to obtain such a license.

Pullets Killed By Bees.

Porterville, Cal.—Two hundred pullets belonging to W. F. Weems, a poultry raiser in the Plano district, were stung to death when a swarm of bees attacked them. The bees, which belong to the Kern County Land company, are brought to this district every year during the orange blossom season. Besides the chickens which were killed, several score of others were so badly stung that they will also die.

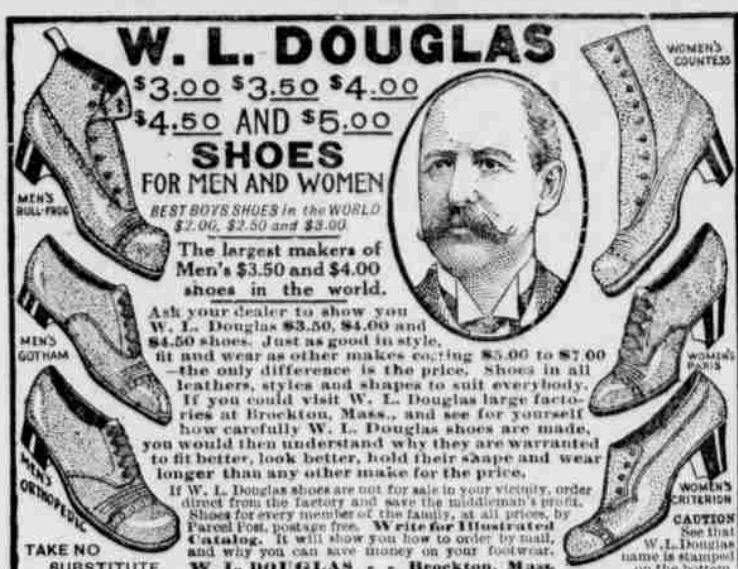
Madero Gift Still Held in Trust.

Washington, D. C.—A watch which the late President Madero, of Mexico, wanted to present to Major Charles J. Hagadorn, Twenty-third United States infantry, is the subject of a bill introduced by Senator McLean. American officers are forbidden to accept gifts from foreign rulers, except by express consent of congress. The State department is holding the watch in trust.

SAVE TIME ON IRONING DAY

Attention to These Small Details Will Lighten Labor and Result in Better Work.

When ironing small articles, such as napkins and handkerchiefs, do not let your iron cool while you do the folding. Iron a table napkin straight and true and dry on the wrong side; lay it aside and iron another and keep on as long as your iron keeps hot enough. Then place the iron on the stove and pull the napkins with the hands and you have the loose folds used by the best housekeepers. Also the thread of the linen stands out nicely on the right side, as does any hemstitching or embroidery that may be there. Linen towels should be done this way, and the most common ones will look wondrously fine, not to mention the appearance of the best ones, says the Washington Herald.
Pillow slips being double, must be ironed on the wrong side and laid aside. When ready to put away in boxes, fold in required size with the hands. Fold your table cloths once wrong side out, and iron on both sides of fold. Place irons on the fire, then fold tablecloth loosely. Treat linen sheets the same way, but cotton ones may be folded twice before ironing.
