General Conference S.D.A. Church

Seventh-day Adventists in various parts of Western Oregon are preparing to attend the quadrennial meeting of the General Conference of that denomination which will be held in Washington D. C. May 15 to June 8, and which will bring together believers in the faith from all parts of the world. A delegation of 15 members will represent the North Pacific Union Conference, which takes in the states of Idaho, Oregon, Montana and Washington. The Western Oregon Conference, which has its headquarters in Portland will be represented by Elders H. W. Cottrell, the president, J. F. Beatty, and C. M. Everest, manager of the Portland Sanitarium. The others will be: Elders C. W. Fiaz, president of the Union; L. Johnson, the president of the Western Washington Conference; A. M. Dart, president of the Southern Idaho Conference; P. A. Hanson, president of the Upper Columbia Conference; W. F. Martin, Religious Liberty Secretary of the North Pacific Union Conference; M. E. Cady, secretary of the Educational Department; J. Riffel, head of the German Department; and E. C. Kellogg, president, and F. W. Peterson, business manager, of Walla Walla College. H. W. Decker, president of the Montana Conference; F. S. Bunch president of the Southern Oregon Conference; and W. R. Beatty, of Portland, Oregon.

These persons will be among delegates that will represent every one of the 25 union conference in the United States, Canada, Europe, Australia, and Africa, and the mission stations in Africa and Asia. While the delegates will number between 800 and 500 the number of persons to attend will swell to about 4000, and believers from all parts of North America will flock to the scene to listen to the important questions concerning the whole denomination which will come up for consideration, and the explanation of Bible themes by leading ministers of the faith.

There are 30 churches in the Western Oregon Conference, and the adherents in Beaverton will await with interest the return of President Cottrell and the other members of the delegation who reside in Western Oregon, to learn of the things accomplished during the session.
