CIRCUIT COURT

Romeo H. Stephens was sentenced by Judge Campbell Tuesday to serve from one to 10 years in the penitentiary and pay the costs of his arrest. He had previously pleaded guilty to embezzlement of funds of the Oregon Electric and was not represented by counsel.

C. H. Martin, indicted for burglarizing McCormick's jewelry store, was arraigned and pleaded guilty and was sentenced to from one to seven years in the penitentiary.

E. L. Devenport was arraigned and given until Saturday, May 31, to plead. The same date was set for receiving the pleas of Carl and Antone Christner and R. E. Britton.

Amendment of the cost bill in the trial of Walton vs. Bruggerman was argued and certain modifications made.

An agreed verdict for defendant in the suit of the Oregon Electric vs. Rohn was given by a jury of one, C. E. Deichman, being the lone man in the jury box.

Carl Slater of Sherwood was arraigned on an indictment charging bestial practices. He pleaded not guilty and bail was fixed at \$1000.

In State vs. Westcott a plea of guilty was made and defendant was sentenced to one year in the county jail and to pay costs. He was paroled and must report to the sheriff monthly.
