CAMP MEETING

More than two thousand Seventh-day Adventists in the western part of Oregon will attend the annual camp-meeting of the West Oregon Conference of that denomination, which will be held at 15th and Davis Streets, Portland, June 19-29. A city of tents will be pitched on the tract known as the Aeronautic field for the accommodation of those who will attend the encampment. Practically all the members of the seven churches in Portland will either be among the campers or daily visitors to the scene.

The leading preachers of the denomination, who will come from Washington D. C., where the world quadrennial conference has just closed. Prof. W. W. Prescott and C. H. Snow will be present from the governing body, and it is very probable that Elder A. G. Daniels' president of the General Conference will also attend.

Between 250 and 300 living tents will be pitched, and large pavilions for the main services, young people's meetings, kindergarten, intermediate department Danish-Norwegian and German services, groceries and dining purposes.

There will be a choir of 100 voices and an orchestra of 21 pieces.
