The burglar had taken a spade and dug a hole under the woodshed door of the main room and chiseled a hole by the side of the lock, as the key was in the other side of the door and he had no pinchers to turn it. Just as he was about to get through into the main building, the freight, enroute to Portland, pulled in and Pappel heard the intruder going out the way he had come in.
