SUFFRAGETTES SPOIL RACES
Reins of Horses Seized While Going Full Speed.

King's Horse Loses Race—Rider Injured and Suffragette Badly Trampled—Outsider Wins.

Epsom, England—Wednesday's race for the derby, the "blue ribbon" of the British turf, was one of the most sensational on record.

It was made memorable by a daring militant suffragette outrage in which Emily Wilding Davison was terribly injured while trying to stop King George's horse, Anmer, when he was running at full speed around Tattenham Corner, by the disqualification for bumping of Craganour, the favorite, after he had finished first; and by the award of the race with its stakes of \$32,500 to a rank outsider, Aboyeur, a 100-to-1 shot.

King George, Queen Mary and a large assembly of royalties were witnesses of these exciting incidents, which caused something like consternation among the immense crowds.

While interest in the classic was at its most tense point, just as the 15 horses were turning the Tattenham corner into the stretch, a woman rushed out of the dense crowd and threw herself in front of Anmer and another horse, Agadir. She apparently hoped to interfere with the progress of the race by seizing Anmer's reins and placing not only herself but the two jockeys in danger.

Fortunately the horses were at the end of the string or the consequences might have been more serious. Agadir, ridden by Jockey Earl, passed in safety, but the woman managed to cling to Anmer's rein and brought down both horse and rider.

Jones, the king's jockey, received injuries necessitating his removal in an ambulance, while the woman was thrown under Anmer's hoofs and terribly kicked. She was taken unconscious to a hospital suffering from severe injuries to her head. Suffragette papers are said to have been found in her possession, and a suffragette flag bound round her body.

GIRL URGES USE OF LABEL
Daughter of Secretary of Labor Speaks on Social Conditions.

St. Louis—Miss Agnes Hart Wilson, daughter of the secretary of labor in President Wilson's cabinet, addressed the National Women's Trade Union League convention here and urged that the women purchasers of clothing be educated to demand the union label.

"I don't favor the boycott," said Miss Wilson, "but I do urge that we start a movement to bring out the garment makers' label on women's clothing. The names of all union makers of women's clothing should be mentioned prominently in the official bulletin of this league. That will advertise the goods and will advertise us."

Miss Wilson told of her personal investigations of social conditions in Washington, D. C., where she found women and children working long hours, under unsanitary conditions and for poor pay.

Miss Wilson said that the work under unsatisfactory conditions to which she referred was in tenement districts and usually was sewing, artificial flower making or other form of piece work.

China Studies Aeroplanes.
San Francisco—Tom Gunn, the young Chinese aviator, left Wednesday on the liner Wilhelmshafen, his destination being Shanghai, where he will establish a military flying school for the new republic. Gunn, who recently received his commission from the Chinese government, had to choose between love and duty. Accomplishing the latter, he hopes to return here within a few months to wed Miss Lily Tong, daughter of a prominent Chinese merchant, who like himself is a native of California.

Gems Pour Into Country.
New York—The indication that local diamond importers are rushing large quantities of gems into this country in expectation of an increase in the tariff, is given in figures compiled by William B. Treadwell, jewelry examiner at the appraisers' stores. According to his report the total value of the gems received through the Port of New York for the month of May reached \$4,606,323. These record-breaking figures are \$1,500,000 greater than the value of the gems imported in May, 1911.

Nightriders Again Busy.
Henderson, Ky.—A reign of terror more serious than similar depredations of recent years is threatened by "night riders" against the tobacco growers of this district. In the last week there have been minor depredations by organized bands, and threatening communications from the "riders" were received by William Elliott, president of the Stemming District Tobacco association, and Leigh Harris, editor of the Henderson Daily Journal.

Mexico Objects to Law.
Mexico City—The minister of foreign affairs has sent a note of protest to Washington against the anti-alien law recently passed by the state of Arizona.

OSLER THEORY IS REVERSED
Watchman Under 45 Years Old Discharged From Service.

Washington, D. C.—The Osler theory is being reversed by the quartermasters' bureau of the War department, through an order, now rigidly enforced, which provides that no man shall be appointed a watchman in the War department service unless he has passed the age of 45 years. This fact came to light recently when the War department ordered the discharge of Benjamin Shaffer, watchman at Fort Lawton, because he was not yet 45 years old. Shaffer had served in the regular army and lost a leg in the service. This brought about his discharge from the service, but as soon as he was able to leave the hospital he was appointed to the watchman's job.

Shaffer had not long been on the payroll as watchman before it was discovered that he was under 45 and immediately this was reported to Washington, his discharge was ordered. His previous military service and the fact that he had lost a leg while serving in the army counted for naught in his favor.

It remained for Representative Humphrey, of the Seattle district, to appeal personally to Secretary Garrison, in order to have Shaffer retained.

The secretary was readily convinced that this was a case where the rule might properly be waived, and thanks to the intervention, Shaffer will continue as watchman at Fort Lawton.

BOY DOES KNOTTY PROBLEM
Mathematical Prodigy Startles Professors With Solution.

Philadelphia—This city harbors a mathematical prodigy and perhaps a rival of Sidis, of Harvard fame, if his solution of the trisection of an angle, a mathematical problem which has puzzled the ages, meets with the approval of several mathematical societies, including the Universities of Pennsylvania and Columbia, as well as a number of mathematicians of national repute to whom the solution has been submitted. The boy is Sydney H. Gross, and he is a student at the Central High School.

The boy mathematician startled the faculty of this high school the other day when he told one of the instructors that he had evolved a solution for the trisection of an angle. The faculty was so impressed with the solution that they immediately submitted a model of the experiment to Professor M. J. Bobb, president of the Philadelphia section of the Middle States and Maryland Mathematical association. The learned professor lectured on the model to his classes at the University of Pennsylvania.

A search through mathematical literature has failed to reveal a solution similar to the one submitted by the youth.

CLUBS GUARD SUFFRAGETTES
Disciplined Defenders With Cudjels Awe London Mobs.

London—Defying the police order closing Hyde Park to their meetings, the Women's Social and Political Union sent speakers Sunday, who held forth there for a long time under the protection of male sympathizers armed with clubs.

When the comparatively peaceful non-militant organizations which are still permitted to use the park finished their customary small demonstrations, flags of the Women's Social and Political Union were raised at 12 different points and as many speakers harangued the crowds.

Mobs of men and boys started to rush the speakers, but much to their amazement, found themselves menaced by disciplined body guards wielding stout cudjels. The crowds had to content themselves with hooting and singing, while the police looked on without attempting to check the speakers.

Wilson's Cousin Locates.
Wahkiacus, Wash.—James C. Wilson and family have located at this place. Mr. Wilson, who says he is a cousin of the President of the United States, expects to engage in business at Wahkiacus. He is firm in the belief that his cousin Woodrow will go down in history as one of the greatest Presidents of the United States. Mr. Wilson is a native son of Oregon and for 40 years lived at North Yamhill. He is the owner of an extensive wheat farm on High Prairie, near Hartland, which he has leased.

"Canned" Talk Demanded.
Greenville, Cal.—The "canned" message of the great white father at Washington is much in demand among the Redskins of the Greenville Indian reservation. Since the information has been received that President Wilson has spoken his message to the aborigine in talking machines, local music stores have been bothered by Indians who want to buy the records, and they are most disappointed to find they are not made for sale.

Ex-Senator Palmer Dies.
Detroit—Ex-United States Senator Thomas Palmer, of Detroit, died Monday after a long illness. He was elected to the United States senate in 1883, and after serving one term was appointed United States minister to Spain. On his return from Spain he was appointed president of the World's Columbian Exposition, held in Chicago in 1893.

Representative Koenig Dies.
Baltimore—Representative Koenig, Democrat, of the third Maryland district, died of pneumonia at his home here Saturday afternoon. He was 57 years old.
