## Meeting of Board of Equalization.

To taxpayers of Washington County, Oregon: Notice is hereby given, that the Board of Equalization of Washington County will meet on Monday Sept. 8th., 1913, at the Court House in Hillsboro in Washington County, that being the second Monday in Sept. and the time and place provided by law, to publicly examine the assessment rolls of said County for 1913, and correct all errors in valuation and description or quantities of land, lots or other properties and it is the duty of all persons interested to appear at the time and place appointed, and if it shall appear to said board of equalization that there are any lands, lots or other property assessed twice or in the name of a person or persons not the owner of the same, or assessed under or beyond its value, or any lots, land or other property not assessed, said board of equalization shall make the proper correction.
