EELWORM THREATENS THE ONION INDUSTRY

Transparent Pests Are Imported From Europe and Baffle Experts

Washington.—Lovers of beef, steak and onions were startled today when the Department of Agriculture announced that the tylenchus devastatrix had invaded the United States and the future of the onion industry was in jeopardy. The invader with the imposing name is also known as the onion eelworm. Hitherto it has confined its operations to Europe, Africa and Australia, but now it has made its appearance in this country.

The Government experts in warning the growers of onions did not minimize the gravity of the appearance here of the eelworm. It seems impervious to chemical remedies that have been tried for its eradication and the eggs of the insect, the experts declare, will survive two years of complete dryness.

"The worms are seldom over one-twentieth of an inch long," says the department experts, "and are very slender and transparent, so that their presence is not generally detected by the naked eye and the grower therefore often remains in ignorance of his loss."

The pest attacks all floral and vegetable bulbs, and is regarded as highly dangerous. In view of this the department urges that all infested plants be sent to it for microscopical examination.
