B. Leis Wins

Forest Grove, Ore. In awarding the prizes for the Washington county Fair for 1913, B. Leis, the progressive fruitgrower of Beaverton, took home eight first prizes and the big special prize of \$40 worth of nursery stock given by the Oregon Nursery Co. of Orenco for best apples and prunes on exhibition. From the whole fair, Mr. Leis' apples were chosen to be sent to the Eastern Land Shows this fall, and the shipment was made November 1, 1913.

Mr. Leis states that Washington county can grow as good apples as any other section, and then he proves it by producing the fruit in his own orchard. His apples have won the blue ribbon in competition with Hood River at Portland two seasons ago.

The executive committee have consulted with a number of prominent Portland attorneys, and their opinion is a unit as to our winning out. Though they all say they would not say we will get a 10-cent cash fare, but will get a big reduction. The law is very pointed in the matter of discrimination, and when a company charges us six times as much as it does its Linnton passengers, that is a clear case of gross discrimination.

Just as soon as Beaverton Rate club puts up its share of the cost, an attorney will be hired and bring our case before the railroad commission as quickly as possible. This is a matter that affects everyone who pays car-fare, and to hurry it along, we urge everyone, whether a member or not, to drop in at the bank and pay Mr. Gray \$1.25. At this writing something over \$50 has been donated. When this is paid out an account will be published, where it goes, showing that there is no graft.

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby notified and required to appear in the above entitled Court, and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled cause on or before Monday, the 24th day of November, 1913, said date being after the expiration of six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, the date of the first publication thereof being October 11th, 1913, and the last publication thereof being November 22nd, 1913; and you will please take notice that if you fail to appear and answer said complaint, plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in her complaint, to-wit, for a decree of the above entitled Court, as follows:

1st: Dissolving the marriage and marriage contract now here tofore existing between Plaintiff and yourself;

2nd: Awarding to the Plaintiff the care, custody and control of Josephine Alfreda Allen, minor child of Plaintiff and yourself;

3rd: And for such other and further relief as to the Court may seem equitable and proper in the premises. The grounds set forth in said complaint for said decree is desertion.
