Rate Club Takes Action

The delegates from Beaverton Rate club met with the Central body at Garden Home, Wednesday evening, November 26, and voted to employ R. R. Giltner as their attorney to fight their case before the railroad commission. Mr. Giltner fought the Milwaukee case successfully through all the courts, including the U. S. supreme court. He is known as a successful fighter, and we confidently expect good results in this case.

A committee was elected to hire Mr. Giltner, and has hired him, paying a retainer fee of \$250, and guaranteeing the balance \$250 more.

Beaverton club has raised \$127, and has paid out \$120 of this to apply on attorney's fee. We want to raise a few more dollars, then call a meeting of the club and pay expenses, there having been none of the expenses paid. Our case will be filed before the railroad commission within a few days, just so soon as the necessary data can be gotten.

School Meeting

At a special school meeting held in Beaverton last Saturday, there was a good attendance for such a meeting, and a six-mill tax was voted without a dissenting vote.

Clerk C. E. Hedge had figures on the blackboard, showing the condition of the district. The outstanding debts being \$4,667 with all notes paid as they are due. The next note maturing will be November 1, 1914, \$1,690, which will be easily met, judging from the past.

The clerk has just completed the annual census of the district, and enrolled 384 pupils over 4 and under 20 years of age, being a gain of 27 over last year.

The valuation of District 48 is \$389,316, being an increase of \$1,186 over last year. This valuation does not include the public utility corporations, which was \$64,306.64 in 1912.

The monthly expenses of the school for teachers and janitor are \$320 per month, somewhat less than last year. This does not include fuel and other incidentals.

The school age is the most critical period of a girl's life. Unfortunately the average mother fails to recognize how much depends upon her attitude to her young daughter at that age. Engrossed with other duties, the school girl's health is a secondary matter altogether. IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby notified and required to appear in the above entitled Court, and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled cause on or before Monday, the 24th day of November 1913, said date being after the expiration of six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, the date of the first publication thereof being October 11th, 1913, and the last publication thereof being November 22nd, 1913; and you will please take notice that if you fail to appear and answer said complaint, plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in her complaint, to-wit, for a decree of the above entitled Court, as follows:

1st: Dissolving the marriage and marriage contract now heretofore existing between Plaintiff and yourself;

2nd: Awarding to the Plaintiff the care, custody and control of Josephine Alfreda Allen, minor child of Plaintiff and yourself;

3rd: And for such other and further relief as to the Court may seem equitable and proper in the premises. The grounds set forth in said complaint for said decree is desertion.
