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HOCKEN IS MAYOR

At the regular meeting of the town council of Beaverton held at City Hall Monday night, W. O. Hocken was installed Mayor, A. H. Spraner, Dr. Carstens, and A. M. Hocken Councilmen, C. H. Fry Recorder, and J. L. Hardy Treasurer. W. E. Pegg, retiring Mayor, made a short farewell speech and congratulated the incoming officials. I.W.W. ARMY INVADE TOWN

Monday, about 4 p. m., over 80 I. W. Ws. hiked from Portland into Beaverton, through the drenching rains. A delegation was sent to Mayor W. O. Hocken, asking for food and shelter during the night. Grange Hall was rented, and the city provided supper and breakfast. After supper some of the leaders spoke upstairs, and the audience was very attentive, "staying all night" right in the hall. A lady by name of Mrs. Rice is De Captainina of the "Brigade," as they term themselves. Other officers were Lieuts Wasgate and Carstens. These men had men on guard all night, and no one was allowed to leave the hall. Tuesday morning the men scrubbed the hall thoroughly before leaving. The "Joan of Arc" stated that they were on their way to Salem to meet Gov. West, who had promised work to their members on arrival. Also that the crowd will be about 14,000 at the capital, and it begins to look like the Governor will have a "full house," and it will be hard to tell "what is trumps." Sheriff Reeves and Deputy McQuillian of Hillsboro were here. Also the town swore in a number of special police to assist Chief Pappel in case of trouble, but happily no trouble appeared. The Brigade left for Hillsboro at 9 a. m., Tuesday, over the S. P. track, "having a tie pass."

BASKET BALL GAME

Although beaten by a score of 23 to 18, the Beaverton team outplayed Astoria big team on teamwork. The score stood 16 to 14 in favor of Astoria until last 8 minutes of play. Evenden was the star for the boys by the sea scoring 6 baskets and 2 fouls, while Ireland starred for Beaverton with 5 baskets and 4 fouls. Allhands was in the limelight for fancy guarding. Berst, Barnes and Davis showed their class in the game.

Manager Roy Berst states that the boys received a royal welcome and have the promise of another game.

Beaverton will play the McLaughlin team, one of the fastest quintette in the state, on the Beaverton floor Saturday night, January 17. Everybody come.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

NOTICE is hereby given that the 1913 tax roll for Washington County, Oregon, will open for the collection and payment of taxes on Monday, February 2, 1914. No rebate will be allowed. All taxes are due and payable before the 1st day of April, 1914, but a penalty of 1 per cent per month will be charged on remaining half payment to be paid, prior to September 1, 1914. Where no payment is made before the 1st day of April, 1914, the tax become delinquent, and a penalty of 1 per cent per month is charged from that date to prior to September 1, 1914. After September 1, 1914, a penalty of 10 per cent and interest at the rate of 12 per cent per year will be charged on all delinquent taxes.
