## 39 Precincts

Under the direction of the county court, George McGee, county surveyor, is preparing descriptions of new voting precincts throughout the county. Hitherto there were 24 such precincts. Under the new system there will be 39, or 15 new ones. The change will be necessitated by the additional voters since the women were given the franchise in Oregon.

The names of the new precincts and the old precincts from which they were formed are:

- Aloha from Wheeler.
- Beaverton, East, from Beaverton and West Butte.
- Beaverton, West, from Beaverton and West Butte.
- Blooming, from Cornelius and South Hillsboro.
- Cornelius, North, from Cornelius.
- Cornelius, South, from Cornelius.
- Connell, from Washington (name changed, but not boundaries.)
- Cherry Grove, from Gaston.
- Dilley, from South Forest Grove.
- Forest Grove, Northeast, from Cornelius and North Forest Grove.
- Forest Grove, Northwest, from North and South Forest Grove.
- Forest Grove, Southeast, from South Forest Grove and Cornelius.
- Forest Grove, Southwest, from South Forest Grove.
- Garden Home, from West Butte and East Butte.
- Hillsboro, Northeast, from North Hillsboro.
- Hillsboro, Northwest, from Columbia and North Hillsboro.
- Hillsboro, Southeast, from South Hillsboro.
- Hillsboro, Southwest, from South Hillsboro.
- Kindt, from West Butte, Reedville and Wheeler.
- Laurel, from South Tualatin and South Hillsboro.
- Middleton, from West Cedar.
- Mulloy, from East Cedar.
- Manning, from Buxton and Banks.
- North Plains, from Columbia.
- Purdin, from North Forest Grove and Banks.
- Scholls, from West Cedar and South Tualatin.
- Sherwood, from East Cedar and West Cedar.
- Tualatin, from East Cedar.
- Tigard, from East Butte.
- Union, from Beaverton (name changed, but not boundaries.)
- Verboort, from Banks, North Forest Grove, Columbia and Cornelius.

The precincts not changed in name or boundaries are Timber, Mountain and Orengo.

The following old precincts have been discarded entirely: Columbia, Beaverton (now Union), East Butte, East Cedar, Washington (now Connell), West Butte, West Cedar, Wheeler.
