TRICKS IN THE BOX

To the Editor:

As you have spoken to me about baseball, I will give a few statements about pitching. Of course every pitcher has his own tricks, which he depends on the infield to watch his movements. Most any pitcher can be rattled if started in the right way. About myself if an umpire is giving the other side the better of the game, I'll get tired and don't care whether the game goes on or not. I believe it is the case with most all pitchers.

The best ways I know of to pitch to a batter and throw him off; to face him a little while before delivering the ball, and next time to deliver the ball quick, and also go through some motions; next time stand straight with both feet in the box and deliver when he isn't expecting it. There are a few other tricks in pitching that might help out some other pitcher; but, as I said before, every pitcher has his trick, and much whether keep them to himself.

For throwing curves, I use in throwing an outdrop two or three fingers. In throwing a very wide outdrop, I always use two fingers and a quick out I use three; also in throwing an outcurve, I use two and sometimes three. The same with an in. But an in drop I use two fingers only. They always break better for me when I use two fingers. But the most funny curve ball is the spit ball. A pitcher cannot tell which way it is going to break, and there is a raise ball, which is awful hard to throw and it is tough on the pitcher too.

A pitcher should never watch second when there is a runner on. Let the catcher watch him and use signals. Often a few pitchers will turn around and watch record, but when he turns to throw to the batter he has to guess where the plate is, and sometimes he will throw wild. I believe the worse game I ever played in last year was the game with Lents at Lents. But there is always an excuse of some kind.

The boys played hard for awhile. I quit pitching in the third or fourth inning and played short. I had no intention of stopping any. They came passing like cannon balls. I let the fielders have them. That was one game—that the fielder had all they wanted to do. I never heard any of the fielders say that they never had much to do. I was satisfied even—to get out of the way.

I believe the most exciting game I pitched was at Gaston. When we played Laurel at Gaston, we won three to two. Although I pitched a few good games in Beaverton, I pitched only one—no hit, no run. That was against the Sunset. I simply was on that day. Don't believe me. Ask Harry Barnes.

I think one of the best time we ever had in going to a game was when Frank Stroud took Tallman, C. Dessinger, E. Evans, and myself up to Gaston. We played Banks that day and won sixteen to two. I struck out eighteen men.

The Sunday before Banks shut us out at Banks, E. Evans, C. Dessinger, Harrison Hughson, and myself drove up to Banks in the Beaverton livery rig, and we were tired when we went on the diamond. I expect to have a better year this year than I did last year.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

NOTICE is hereby given that the 1913 tax roll for Washington County, Oregon, will open for the collection and payment of taxes on Monday, February 2, 1914. No rebate will be allowed. All taxes are due and payable before the 1st day of April, 1914, but a penalty of 1 per cent per month will be charged on remaining half payment to be paid, prior to September 1, 1914. Where no payment is made before the 1st day of April, 1914, the tax becomes delinquent, and a penalty of 1 per cent per month is charged from that date to prior to September 1, 1914. After September 1, 1914, a penalty of 10 per cent and interest at the rate of 12 per cent per year will be charged on all delinquent taxes.
