started, and I know all of the

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

NOTICE is hereby given that the 1913 tax roll for Washington
County, Oregon, will open for the collection and payment of taxes
on Monday, February 2, 1914. No rebate will be allowed. All
taxes are due and payable before the 1st day of April, 1914, but a
penalty of 1 per cent per month will be charged on remaining half
payment to be paid, prior to September 1, 1914. Where no pay-
ment is made before the 1st day of April, 1914, the tax becomes de-
quint, and a penalty of 1 per cent per month is charged from
that date to prior to September 1, 1914. After September 1, 1914,
penalty of 10 per cent and interest at the rate of 12 per cent per
year will be charged on all delinquent taxes.
