HOW TO SPRAY FRUIT TREES

BY B. LEIS.

Editor Owl:

Much has been said and writ-
ten about spraying by some that
know and by others that appar-
ently don't know anything about
it. It is all very well to sit back
in your office and tell us how to
do it, but have they an orchard?
and have they tried it out, and
with what success?

Some dealers in spray material
tell us to use 11 to 15 parts of
water to 1 of lime and sulphur
solution.

Now I know from experience
that it is too weak for results. It
would be nearly right for a sum-
mer wash, but it will not have
any effect on scale or other pests
that infest the orchard. Two dif-
ferent brands of spray came to
my notice; one brand I bought
myself for which I paid \$10,
which tested 25 Beaume. The
other went some better and went
27 by the hydrometer; now by
adding 11 parts of water to such
solution will make it too weak
and is practically useless for a
winter spray, so it is no surprise
that some with weak knees get
discouraged and say, "I sprayed
and it seems to be food for the
scale." Well, maybe it is, I have
been in the same fix when my
orchard was in a very bad shape.

Of course, if the spraying is
not done thoroughly, you cannot
expect good results no matter
how good your material may be.
Some years ago, when Mr. Har-
ris was fruit inspector for Wash-
ington county, he asked a farm-
er: Well, Mr. —, did you spray
your trees?" "You bet I did,"
and when he investigated, he
found he had sprayed with pure
stuff that is pure creek water.
Well, he had sprayed anyway.
This he told me happened at
Dilley.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

NOTICE is hereby given that the 1913 tax roll for Washington
County, Oregon, will open for the collection and payment of taxes
on Monday, February 2, 1914. No rebate will be allowed. All
taxes are due and payable before the 1st day of April, 1914, but a
penalty of 1 per cent per month will be charged on remaining half
payment to be paid, prior to September 1, 1914. Where no pay-
ment is made before the 1st day of April, 1914, the tax become delin-
quent, and a penalty of 1 per cent per month is charged from
that date to prior to September 1, 1914. After September 1, 1914,
a penalty of 10 per cent and interest at the rate of 12 per cent per
year will be charged on all delinquent taxes.
