

The election throughout the county passed off quietly Monday, and unlike under the old law, there was no ticket peddling or bribery. Every man voted his own ticket, using his own free will. At the hour of going to press, the only offices in doubt are those of circuit judge and member of the state board of equalization.

The voters throughout the county show from their vote that in these particular contests, party affiliations were laid aside, politics cutting no figure whatever. The people expect careful and economical public service, and their vote plainly shows that they are very well satisfied with the present clerk and sheriff. In the north end of the county, both these candidates got about their party vote, but ran considerably ahead in the southern and central portions.
