THE OFFICIAL PAPER OF GILLIAM COUNTY, OREGON.

From the official vote at the late state election it is learned that the total vote cast for congressman in the first district was 40,751, and in the second district 34,897, total in the state, 75,648. Hermann's plurality is 5910, but as Rork, the people's party candidate, had 7518 votes, and Rigdon, prohibitionist, 1285 votes, Hermann lacks 2883 votes of having a majority. In the second district Ellis' plurality over Slater is 3539, but as Luce, people's, received 5940, and Bright, prohibition, 1178 votes, Ellis lacks 2579 of a majority. Moore's plurality over Bennett for supreme judge is only 2575 in the state, while he lacks 12,422 votes of having a majority. For attorney-general Chamberlain, democrat, is elected over Webster, republican, there being no other candidates, by a majority of 430.—Portland Telegram.

The Heppner Gazette, a republican paper, says: "It is reported that when L. R. Webster received the information that almost the entire newspaper fraternity of Oregon was arrayed against him, he passed the matter over lightly and thought himself secure with over 8000 majority at his back. But he was beaten, and that on principle. It will teach a wholesome lesson. A public servant must conduct himself as becomes his station, or cease seeking office; he must take into consideration that the newspapers can defeat or elect a man; that they have some influence after all. Though some of them in the state of Oregon are published in remote places, it is not well to scorn their efforts."

Hon. John W. Foster of Indiana, has been appointed secretary of state by President Harrison. He was sent as United States minister to Mexico by Grant in 1873, and was reappointed by Hayes in 1880. In March of that year he was transferred to Russia, and held that mission until November, 1881, when he resigned. President Arthur then appointed him minister to Spain. He served from February, 1883, to March, 1885, when he resigned and returned to the United States, having negotiated an important commercial treaty with Spain.

The Oregon Pacific managers have contracted for 10,000 ties with which to repair their road between Albany and the front, and are making other demonstrations indicative of their intention of pushing the road to an eastern terminus.—Ochoco Review. [The survey of the road in question crosses Butte creek a few miles east of Fossil, runs through Condon and will intersect with the U. P. at Pendleton].

James Lotan has been appointed collector of customs at Portland, and was confirmed by the senate Friday. Mr. Lotan is a native of New York, aged about fifty years, and is one of the most energetic business men of Portland. His appointment will give general satisfaction after the first breeze of disappointment blow over. Twenty-five men could not be appointed to one position.—Dalles Chronicle.

Senator Peffer in presenting a petition from Kansas asking that congress take action to stop the lynchings which are becoming so frequent, said that the practice was growing in all parts of the country—north, south, east and west, and that he hoped the judiciary committee, to which the petition was referred, would promptly report on the subject.
