Quarterly examination is in progress here this week, under Supt. Parker, assisted by Miss Lena Snell. There are four applicants for teachers' certificates—Misses Maggie Keys of Mayville, Mrs. King of Arlington, Amanda Helms of Dutch Flat, and Mr. Hill of the Rock creek saw mill.

Col. Lucas and Capt. Wilcox arrived home from The Dalles Tuesday with the headquarters parapsalmalia of the 3d regiment, which have been moved from that place to Condon. Col. Lucas has received his commission, and as soon as the large armory is completed, our city will present a very respectable military appearance.

A divorce suit was filed with the county clerk this week by Mrs. Dora J. Madden against her husband, John Madden, both of Lone Rock. This will doubtless be an interesting case, as we understand a large alimony is asked for by the plaintiff. Deputy Sheriff Tom Johnson went over to Lone Rock Wednesday and served the summons upon Mr. Madden.

Bill Thurnagle and Dan Ward began the work Thursday of sinking the county well deeper. They say they will not stop, either, until they get plenty of water, which is doubtless true, as they are steady and industrious gentlemen who are not afraid of work. Had such men taken charge of it a year ago, the well would have been finished in one month's time.

Assessor Dave Mason is in town this week, at work on the assessment roll. See equalization notice elsewhere. Mr. Mason has always been very careful with his work, and it has never yet been found necessary to make any change in his assessment. He has made an efficient officer, and will now step down and out with credit to himself and the people whom he so faithfully served.

We are glad to state that Mr. Mackey, the photographer, has concluded to locate permanently at Condon. He says it is the best small town in the West. He has engaged gallery room over Gene Smith's new harness shop, and after making a round lasting about six weeks, he will return to this place. He has used excellent judgment in making his selection for a permanent location.

Scientists have estimated that every year a layer equal to fourteen feet of the entire surface of all oceans and other waters is taken up into the atmosphere in the shape of vapor, to fall as rain and again flow back into the seas.

A few people were inclined to treat it as a joke when the Globe advertised some weeks since for a lawyer for this place. Our new attorney, Mr. Goode, has been kept busy almost day and night since his arrival here, and he informs us that his business has far exceeded his most sanguine expectations. A very large portion of the business to come before the next term of circuit court will be conducted by Mr. Goode. Among the many cases in his hands now are three or four divorce suits.

The number of newspapers published in all countries is estimated at 41,000, of which number about 24,000 appear in Europe. Germany leads the European list with 5,000, then comes France with 4,100, England with 4,000, Austria-Hungary with 1,500, Italy with 1,400, Spain with 950, Russia with 800, Switzerland with 450, Belgium and Holland with 300 each, and the rest are published in Portugal, the Scandinavian and the Balkan countries. Besides the Globe, the United States has 13,000 newspapers, Canada has 700 and Australia also has 700.

The people of the United States therefore read and support about as many newspapers as England, France, Germany and Russia combined.

We are glad to see that our citizens are taking the Globe's advice of last week and are digging more wells here. Nearly a dozen more new wells are being sunk in different portions of the town, and abundance of good water is being reached in all of them within seven or eight feet of the surface. There isn't a town in the county that can secure as much good water so near the surface as at Condon. The only exception is that of the county well which is 20 feet deep, and contains only one foot of water. This is due to the fact that it is on the highest point in town, and it will be necessary to go a few feet deeper. With the exception of Arlington, on the Columbia river, Condon has the best water supply of any town in the county, notwithstanding the drunken grunts of a few jealous soreheads who are envious of the town's prosperity.

Important Circular.

U. S. LAND OFFICE,
The Dalles, Or., August 3, 1892.
By act of congress, approved September 29, 1890, claimants, under the third section, were allowed two years from that date in which to pay for the land to which they were legally entitled. By a subsequent act—Feb. 1891—this time was extended to the 3d day of February, 1893, and by another and recent act the time was further extended, "to actual residents only," to three years from September 29, 1890. So that, as the law now stands, parties entitled to purchase under the third section, but not actual residents on the land, must make payment on or before Feb. 3, 1893. Actual residents on the land will have until September 29, 1893.
