THE ELOPEMENT.

Ed Newman After His Daughter and Scott Alderson.

Saturday's Oregonian says: Sheriff Kelly received a dispatch yesterday from Ed Newman, a prominent farmer of Fossil, Gilliam county, asking him to look up his 14-year-old daughter May Newman, who eloped with Scott Alderson from that place two weeks ago. All the records in several of the counties adjoining were searched, but no entry of a marriage license was found. Saturday, 13th, the couple were at Troutdale, a few miles east of Portland, on the Union Pacific, and had a small spaniel dog with them. The girl is prepossessing in appearance and well-developed physically for her age.

Portland Telegram: Sunnyside, in East Portland, is temporarily stirred up by a slight sensational breeze caused by the elopement of Scott Alderson, aged 28 years, the son of a Methodist preacher, and Miss May Newman, aged 14 years, both from Fossil, Gilliam county.

About two weeks ago Alderson drove up to Dr. Heustis' residence and asked him whether he kept boarders, and whether or not he could accommodate a young lady at the house. The doctor, having known the young man from boyhood, and thinking everything was all right, gave the girl the accommodations requested. Alderson, on the other hand, stopped with his uncle, near by, until a day or two ago, when the couple left Sunnyside, presumably for British Columbia, without as much as saying adieu to the doctor and Mrs. Heustis.

Friday last the girl's papa appeared upon the scene, asking for his daughter, but as she had taken wings unto herself he was unable to find her. Then he resorted to the aid of the police and deputy sheriffs, who are not likely to discover them within their jurisdiction. Papa Newman says he has no objection to Alderson, but he is unwilling to have his daughter marry at the age of 14 years. Sensible old gentlemen; but by this time his demerit has most probably been overruled.

LATER.

PORT TOWNSEND, Aug. 23.—Scott Alderson and May Newman, who eloped from Fossil, Gilliam county, two weeks ago, were arrested here today by the chief of police and locked up in the city jail. Edward Newman, the girl's father arrived today and will leave tonight in charge of the pair for Gilliam county, where Alderson will have to answer to the charge of abduction. The girl insists that she will marry Alderson; but the angry father has sworn out a warrant for him and he will be tried at the next term of the circuit court for Gilliam county.

The couple came here on the Wilmington from Portland, via Victoria, and were promptly arrested. Alderson is a son of C. C. Alderson, of East Portland, an influential pillar of the Methodist church. Down in Gilliam county he laid siege to May's heart. Her parents objected, owing to her age, and they eloped, walking part of the distance to Arlington, the nearest railroad point, in order to avoid riding through the towns along the stage route. They boarded the westbound train and when within 16 miles of Portland they got off and drove into the city, as they suspected a telegram would intercept them at Portland. They embarked at once on the steamer Wilmington. The father in the meantime was in hot pursuit and arrived in Portland only a few hours after their departure. When the couple arrived in Victoria they found that a telegram to the police had preceded them and, had they landed, would have been arrested, hence their exit to this city, where they were successfully bagged.

Capt. J. T. Apperson, register of the Oregon City land office, says: "Settlers who have filed homestead claims and desire to make proof and pay for the land must prove at least 14 months actual residence since the date of entry to entitle them to commute and pay cash for the land. The time they have lived on the land before filing will not be allowed when they seek to commute. It will be allowed where they continue residence and make five years' residence on their homesteads."

It was amusing to see in last week's Journal how "Citizen" dropped the gloves and went to hair-pulling.
