Howard Propert returned home last week from the Helix country, where he had been at work since spring. He expects to attend the business college at Albany this winter, beginning in about four weeks.

Our school began Monday with a large attendance, there being 70 pupils enrolled the first day and enough more to come in to swell the number to over 100. An assistant teacher will take charge of the primary department next week.

Gene Smith moved his stock of goods into his fine new harness shop this week, which is a very creditable building. The second story will be occupied by Mackey Bros., photographers, immense skylights having been placed in the roof for that purpose.
