Moro Observer: There is at this office for signature a petition addressed to Congress praying for an extension of the time in which payment should be made on "railroad" claims. The petition already has been numerously signed and if our representatives at Washington will urge the passage of a relief act granting the extension asked for, they will place the settlers on these forfeited lands under everlasting obligations. The petition asks for an extension of time for payment two years. The petition should be favorably received by congress, as it will work a great hardship on many of the settlers if they are required to make payment next year.

A Wyoming man, writing a long letter to an eastern paper in explanation of the rustler troubles, says the rich cattlemen have had free occupancy of the government lands for so many years that they now look on them as their own, and are unwilling to give them up for settlement to actual homesteaders, although the government opened them to the settlers. The war attempted by the rich cattlemen was, he says, a war to drive the homesteaders off the lands they had taken under government guarantee. In any case it is probable the days of the great cattle ranges are numbered, and that more cattle will be raised hereafter in smaller bunches by farmers.

Printers will no longer be compelled to compete with the government in the stamped and printed envelope business. A bill making it unlawful for the government to furnish envelopes of this description has passed congress, and the business will therefore be discontinued. It was a measure that took hundreds of thousands of dollars out of the pockets of the printers of the land, and should have been repealed long ago.

A great many people believe that everything they see in a newspaper voices the sentiments of its editor, which is a mistake. The East Oregonian explains the matter as follows: "For the benefit of those who don't know better, the East Oregonian will say that when it copies an article from some other paper, it in no way indorses or approves the contents of the article, but it is simply done as a matter of news."

It has been discovered that the Indians who have been coming down from British Columbia every year to pick hops in Washington, violate the alien labor law, and they will be henceforth kept out of the state, which will be \$8,000 to \$10,000 better off each year by employing people who will spend their money where they earn it.

County Judge Colvig of Josephine county last Monday sentenced Sheriff Shattuck to \$50 fine or 25 days in jail, because the delinquent taxes have not been collected. The case will go to the circuit court on appeal. Mr. Shattuck has given bonds in the sum of \$400 in the matter.

The secretary of the interior has apportioned the surveying appropriations. Oregon gets \$35,000, an increase of \$15,000 over last year. Of this amount, \$15,000 is to be used on public lands within the railroad land grants.

To receive a paper three or four years without paying for it is enough to destroy the delinquent subscriber's respect for the publisher.—Galveston News.
