THE OFFICIAL PAPER OF GILLIAM COUNTY, OREGON.

Alexander Bergman, the anarchist who tried to kill H. C. Frick during the Homestead riot, had his trial at Pittsburg last week. Bergman conducted his own case and plead not guilty. Frick took the stand and testified to the facts of the attempted assassination, it being corroborated by several witnesses of the assault. Bergman was perfectly cool during the trial. At the conclusion of the testimony for the state, Bergman refused to be sworn, but read a long statement in his own defense, declaring his act was the outgrowth of oppression of labor by capital, and asserting that the end of the struggle between them was near, with the result of the freedom of labor, that his reason for shooting Frick was to rid the earth of an oppressor of workmen. The Judge had finally to limit him as to time and then cut off his discourse. The jury returned a verdict of guilty without leaving their seats. The sentence was 21 years in the penitentiary and one year in the workhouse. He had set ten years as the limit of the sentence that he could conscientiously accept, declaring that if given more he would be forced to resort to suicide. But he didn't, and even had he done so, the country would have been none the worse off.

New York has had but six deaths yet from cholera. All the patients were at once isolated, and the health officers are now confident that the plague is under control. All the vessels in the harbor are still under rigid quarantine regulations. The S. F. Examiner says: "Denver officials believed that they had found three cases that were likely to develop into Asiatic cholera. Did they permit them to remain there to sow their fair city with comma bacilli? Denver officials would not be so careless. Instead of isolating the suspects they placed them aboard an emigrant sleeper, with tickets for San Francisco, tucked them in neatly and had them godspeed."

An Oregon widow has sued a doctor for breach of promise. She avers that he had agreed to marry her whenever his wife should die of consumption. The widow has discovered not only that the wife has no trace of consumption and never had, but is in every way appallingly robust. While the plaintiff, it would be judged, is entitled to sympathy, the promise, viewed from the standpoint of impartial observation, seems as far from any sign of breach as on the day it was made. A reasonable compromise verdict would be for the doctor to take to the woods.

Another argument against long or severe sentences on the ground of purely circumstantial evidence may be taken from the case of Jas. F. Tipton, just pardoned from the Oregon penitentiary. He was sentenced in 1889 to 20 years for forgery, but affidavits have been made proving his innocence beyond a doubt.

Washington has solved the convict problem, in so far as it makes this very troublesome class a benefit to the people of the state. At the penitentiary at Walla Walla, convicts make grain sacks, which the farmers are enabled to buy about two cents cheaper than in former years.

Chinese are persistently refusing to register, a fact that is temporarily annoying, but holds out a cheering promise of such an exodus of the almond-eyed heathens as has never yet gladdened the new world.

An exchange says men who are in the employ of the government never strike. Just so. What better proof is needed that the government should control the railroads, where strikes are most common.

The U. S. is richer by \$2,000,000 in money orders never presented.
