Circuit court adjourned Monday evening, after one week's unusually hard labor, there being a large amount of criminal business to dispose of. Circuit court convenes at Moro, Sherman county, next Monday.

Geo. Tatam, contractor, and his crew of workmen finished the new county bridge at Butler's ford on Rock creek this week. It is a splendid job, and, like the jail, reflects much credit upon the contractors.

Dr. J. A. Weldon, dentist, writes us from Arlington that he will be at Condon next Thursday and will remain two weeks. He says the Keeley cure is the grandest thing in the world, and that he never felt better in his life.

Charley Sears and wife expect to start today for a month's visit among relatives and friends at Portland and Vancouver. They had their trunks packed and were ready to go two weeks ago, when Charley was "nailed" as a jurymen.

Last Thursday was the most disagreeable day in the history of this country. The wind blew a terrific hurricane, lasting nearly all day. No damage was done except covering everything in all the buildings with an inch or two of sand.

Ernest Seekamp didn't find admission into circuit court with his suit, for obstructing a public highway, as per his desire. He came in Thursday and paid his fine of \$50 and costs, amounting in all to \$173.25, and went away rejoicing (?)

H. L. Propst assisted in the clerk's office during court week. He will leave next week for Albany, where he will attend the business college until spring. Howard is an honorable and industrious young man, and will make a mark in the world yet.

Sheriff Wilcox started Monday for Salem with his one-year prisoner, L. E. Stevenson. This mode of life will not be entirely new to Mr. Stevenson, as he has had a 2-year dose of it before in the same institution, having been sent from Douglas county.

In our rush last week our type erred in the mention of the attorneys present, G. W. Rea's name being substituted by that of Mackey. Mr. Rea of Heppner is the oldest attorney of the lot, and has had a world of successful experience in that line of business.

Saturday last five masked men robbed the bank at Roslyn, Wash., and got away with over \$10,000. They failed to get \$40,000 that had arrived there that day for the miners, and which encouraged them to commit the rash act. Several persons were wounded by the robbers. They are still at large, and \$2500 reward is offered for their capture.

W. R. Burnham of Storm Lake, Iowa, mention of whom we made two weeks ago, arrived in Condon Monday, and has formed a law partnership with Geo. W. Goode. Mrs. C. H. Ogle, of Penasola, Kansas, accompanied by her five children, arrived here Friday evening for a couple of month's visit with her mother, Mrs. E. Meek and other relatives in this section. Her brother John met her at Arlington by private conveyance. It was ten years since Mrs. Ogle last saw her mother, and her visit here will be a pleasant one.

We are pleased to state that H. B. Hendricks, the live insurance agent and lawyer of Fossil, has concluded to locate at Condon. His lumber arrived this week and Robert Neal, carpenter, has begun work on his dwelling house, which is being built on the two lots just purchased by Mr. H., on the corner west of the public square. Mr. Hendricks and L. W. Darling have formed a law partnership, with their office adjoining the drug store. Both these gentlemen expect to be admitted to the bar this winter, and they will doubtless get a very large share of the legal work of this county. Mr. Hendricks and family are good citizens and we heartily welcome them to our town.

Disastrous Fires.

There were several fires in our neighborhood this week. Monday morning about 8 o'clock John Harrison's large sheep shed on Thirtymile, 200 feet long by 40 feet wide, burned to the ground. The loss is about \$500, with no insurance. Mr. Harrison found fresh tracks in the sand leading away from the shed, and says there is not the slightest doubt that it is the work of an incendiary. He says he is satisfied who did the dirty work, although no arrests have yet been made.

Tuesday morning about 3 o'clock, Grant Wade's dwelling house in Scott Canyon, a few miles north of town, also burned. No one was in the house at the time except Mr. Wade, who was sleeping up stairs. He waked up just in time to save his life. The fire originated below and the first he knew of it was by the roaring of the flames and by the smoke which almost suffocated him. It didn't take him long to make up his mind to get out of that, but in doing so he was pretty badly scorched about the head and face, nearly all of his mustache and eyelashes being singed off. All he saved was what he had on, which wasn't much, of course. In that condition he travelled over to the home of his father-in-law, Mr. Josephus Martin, 8 miles distant, where he happened to have one suit of clothes. The origin of the fire is not known. After 8 o'clock the evening before, Mr. Wade says there was no fire about the place that he knew of. The loss is about \$700, with \$400 insurance. L. W. Darling is agent for the company in which the property was insured, and Wednesday morning he went down to the place to adjust the loss.

Wedding Bells.

Sunday last, Sept. 25, 1892, was solemnized the marriage of Mr. Chas. G. Frazer and Miss Emma Smith, both of Lone Rock. They were married at the residence of Col. Lucas at Condon, Judge Bradshaw performing the ceremony. The contracting parties belong to the best people in the country and are well and favorably known. Married, at Portland Sept. 24, 1892, Dr. J. Holt Frazer and Miss Laura F. Walker, both of Portland, Rev. G. E. Hawes officiating. Dr. Frazer is a brother of our genial deputy clerk, H. N. Frazer, and is one of the leading physicians of that city.

A Serious Charge.

The citizens of Fossil were thrown into dangerous excitement Wednesday by the discovery of Wm. Cunningham in the act of attempting to commit rape upon the person of Ed Newman's little 8-year-old girl, in a barn in that town. Excitement ran dangerously high, but fortunately mob violence was avoided by quick action of the authorities. Cunningham only surrendered when forced to do so at the muzzle of a shotgun in the hands of Marshal Morgan. He was placed under \$5000 bonds, which he was unable to give, and Marshal Morgan quickly rushed him off to the county jail at Condon, where he is safe from mob violence at least. He will await the action of the grand jury next April, at which time his case will receive attention.

Cunningham has been in the Fossil country six or seven years, devoting most of the time to sheep-herding, but has been in the butchering business at Fossil during the last three years. He is about 45 years of age, and has heretofore borne a fair reputation.

ACQUITTED.

Daniel H. Ward Again a Free Citizen.

Never since the organization of this county has there been a case within its borders in which such intense interest was manifested as in that brought about by the killing of John Looney by Dan Ward the first day of last July, the particulars of which are familiar to all our readers.

The examination of jurors for the case began Thursday morning and lasted throughout the day, till 11 o'clock at night and until 10 o'clock next morning. Thirty-five jurors were examined before twelve unprejudiced men were accepted, so strong was public sentiment in favor of Ward. Ten were excused by the defendant. The following 12 comprised the jury:

Pope Catlin, H. J. Nott, Clayton Shane, Chas. Prindle, Harvey Martin, J. L. Fredenburg, O. F. Kizer, L. C. Hoffman, J. H. Bowen, J. M. Carl, Arthur Myers and Lige Hendrix—all as honorable men as ever sat on a jury.

The prosecution made an able and vigorous effort to sustain their cause, being conducted by the district attorney and H. S. Wilson of The Dalles, and J. N. Brown of Heppner, while the defense was very ably represented by Hon. A. S. Bennett, assisted by Geo. W. Goode and H. H. Hendricks.

Throughout the trial, the large hall was constantly crowded by anxious spectators, and Saturday evening it was almost necessary for the multitude to pack in like sardines in order to get inside to hear the closing arguments. Mr. Bennett made a powerful and masterly plea in behalf of the defendant, lasting two hours, and which had a deep and thrilling effect upon the jury and audience. This was followed by an equally lengthy and masterly effort in behalf of the state by W. H. Wilson, prosecuting attorney, and the case was given to the jury at 12 o'clock.

After being out two hours they returned a verdict of "not guilty." The jury really agreed upon this verdict five minutes after retiring to the jury room, but deemed it better form to deliberate an hour or two before rendering the verdict.

Thus ends one of the most interesting cases of the kind ever heard in the state. So far as we know, the verdict gives almost universal satisfaction.

To Our School Patrons.

The amount of public money on hand in our district at present is \$250, which falls short about \$350 of being sufficient to run the six months term of school, at the rate of \$100 per month, the amount it will take.

After careful consideration, we have concluded that the most practical and satisfactory manner, to the district at large, by which to raise the necessary amount is to levy a rate bill, and thus raise the amount among the patrons of the district who send children to the school. This rate tax will be collected at the end of the term. All scholars attending our school from outside the district will be charged as follows: For the grammar department, \$6 per quarter, and the primary department, \$5 per quarter, payable strictly in advance.
