LONE ROCK, Nov. 5, 1892.

EDITOR GLOBE:—In the case of Nettie Robinson's arrest for the alleged disturbance of a religious meeting at this place, which your millions of readers have already had a history of from "Cowboy's" pen, I desire to call attention to several expressions in his articles, which were an injustice to the young lady.

I attended the trial, and in the judgment of those not interested in the prosecution, it seems to have been, in Miss Robinson's case, one mainly brought about by personal spite and malice, and all it lacked of being worthy of the 17th century was the power.
